#### ORDINANCE NO. 2020-04

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FOWLER ADDING CHAPTER 24 TO TITLE 5 OF THE FOWLER MUNICIPAL CODE PROHIBITING SMOKING IN CITY FACILITIES AND VEHICLES, AMENDING SECTIONS 10-1.02 AND 10-1.05 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE PROHIBTING SMOKING IN CITY PARKS, AND AMENDING CERTAIN DEFINITIONS IN SECTION 5-20.03 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE PERTAINING TO THE TOBACCO RETAILERS' REGULATIONS

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FOWLER DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

**SECTION 1**. Chapter 24 of Title 5 is hereby added to the Fowler Municipal Code to read as follows:

#### Chapter 24

#### **SMOKING PROHIBITION**

5-24.01:	Smoking Prohibited.
5-24.02:	Definitions.
5-24.03:	Penalties and Enforcement.
5-24.04:	Severability.

#### 5-24.01 – Smoking Prohibited.

Smoking is prohibited in the following areas:

- (a) In all City facilities and picnic shelter areas in any City park;
- (b) In all City owned or City operated parks, trails, recreation areas, walking paths, bike paths, playgrounds, aquatic and sports facilities, both enclosed and unenclosed; and
- (c) In all City owned or City operated vehicles.
- (d) The City Manager may implement administrative policies and/or practices consistent with the smoking prohibition provided in this chapter, including the posting of signs in the City and in City vehicles, and may restrict smoking in such other City owned or operated areas as may be deemed necessary.

#### 5-24.02 — Definitions.

As used within this chapter, the following definitions apply:

"Enclosed Areas" means facilities designed with a solid roof and walls, closable windows and/or doors on all sides.

"City facilities" means buildings, parking lots, and any other areas or equipment which are owned, leased, or operated by the City.

"Smoking" means inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying any lighted, heated or ignited cigar, cigarette, cigarillo, pipe, hookah, electronic smoking device, cannabis, or any plant or weed product, intended for human inhalation. "Smoking" includes the use of an electronic smoking device that creates an aerosol or vapor, in any manner or in any form, or the use of any oral smoking device for the purpose of circumventing the prohibition of smoking.

"Vehicles" means motorized equipment powered either by any type of gasoline and a combustion engine, electricity, battery, or solar power, whether fully enclosed with a roof, doors, and fixed or movable windows, or fully or partially unenclosed and containing either no roof, no doors, or no windows, including but not limited to automobiles, trucks, tractors, motorcycles, riding mowers, golf carts, and similar motorized equipment.

#### 5-24.03 - Penalties and Enforcement.

Fines may be assessed for violations of this chapter in accordance with section 1-8.08 of the Municipal Code, in addition to any other remedies available under the Municipal Code for infractions.

#### 5-24.04 - Severability.

The provisions of this chapter are hereby declared to be severable. If any provision, clause, word, sentence, or paragraph of this chapter or the application thereof to any person, establishment, or circumstances shall be held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the other provisions of this chapter.

**SECTION 2**. Section 10-1.05 of Chapter 1 of Title 10 of the Fowler Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

### 10-1.02 – Definitions.

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"Parks" include parks, playgrounds, open space, picnic shelter areas, recreation areas, trails, walking paths, bike paths, pool and sports facilities, any parking lots or parking areas associated with such areas, and other areas owned by, dedicated to, leased to, or operated or maintained by the City, and operated for recreational purposes.

#### 10-1.05 – Rules and Regulations.

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(o) Alcoholic Beverages and Smoking. Alcoholic beverages are not permitted on City property, including buildings, parks and parking lotsprohibited in City facilities and parks, except as otherwise provided in accordance with Section 10-1.03 of this chapter. Smokingis not permitted in any City building., as defined in Section 5-24.02 of this Code, is prohibited in all City facilities and parks as provided in Section 5-24.01 of this Code.

**SECTION 3**. Section 5-20.3 of Chapter 20 of Title 5 of the Fowler Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### 5-20.3 — Definitions.

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"Tobacco paraphernalia" means cigarette papers or wrappers, pipes, holders of smoking materials of all types, cigarette rolling machines, and any other item designed or marketed for the smoking, preparation, storing, or consumption of tobacco products.

"Tobacco Product" means: (1) any substance containing tobacco leaf, including but not limited to cigarettes, cigars, pipe tobacco, hookah tobacco, snuff, chewing tobacco, dipping tobacco, bidis, or any other preparation of tobacco; and (2) any product or formulation of matter containing biologically active amounts of nicotine that is manufactured, sold, offered for sale, or otherwise distributed with the expectation that the product or matter will be introduced into the human body, but does not include any product specifically approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for use in treating nicotine or tobacco product dependence.

- (a) Any product containing, made of, or derived from tobacco or nicotine that is intended for human consumption, whether smoked, heated, chewed, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, or ingested by any other means, including but not limited to cigarettes, cigars, cigarillos, little cigars, pipe tobacco, chewing tobacco, snuff; and
- (b) Any electronic smoking device that delivers nicotine or other substances to the person inhaling from the device, including but not limited to an electronic cigarette, electronic cigar, electronic pipe, or electronic hookah.
- (c) But does not mean or include any drug, product, device, or combination thereof that has been approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco cessation product or for other therapeutic purposes where such product is marketed and sold solely for such approved purpose.

**SECTION 4**. If any article, section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the

remaining portions this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance, and each article, section, subsection, sentence, clause, and phrase hereof, irrespective of the fact that one or more articles, sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, and phrases be declared invalid.

**SECTION 5.** The City Clerk is hereby directed to cause a summary of this Ordinance to be published by one insertion in a newspaper of general circulation in the community at least five (5) days prior to adoption, and again fifteen (15) days after its adoption. If a summary of the ordinance is published, then the City Clerk shall cause a certified copy of the full text of the proposed ordinance to be posted in the office of the City Clerk at least five days prior to the Council meeting at which the ordinance is adopted ad again after the meeting at which the ordinance at which adopted and again after the meeting at which the ordinance is adopted. The summary shall be approved by the City Attorney.

**SECTION 6.** This ordinance shall go into effect and be in full force and operation from and after thirty (30) days after its final passage and adoption.

RE: DESIGNATION OF VOTING DELEGATES AND ALTERNATES
League of California Cities Annual Conference & Expo – October 7 – 9, 2020

The League's 2020 Annual Conference & Expo is scheduled for October 7-9. An important part of the Annual Conference is the Annual Business Meeting (during General Assembly) on Friday, October 9. At this meeting, the League membership considers and takes action on resolutions that establish League policy.

In order to vote at the Annual Business Meeting, your city council must designate a voting delegate. Your city may also appoint up to two alternate voting delegates, one of whom may vote in the event that the designated voting delegate is unable to serve in that capacity.

Please complete the attached Voting Delegate form and return it to the League's office no later than Wednesday, September 30. This will allow us time to establish voting delegate/alternate records prior to the conference.

Please note the following procedures are intended to ensure the integrity of the voting process at the Annual Business Meeting. These procedures assume that the conference will be held inperson at the Long Beach Convention Center as planned. Should COVID-19 conditions and restrictions prohibit the League from holding an in-person conference, new procedures will be provided.

- Action by Council Required. Consistent with League bylaws, a city's voting delegate and up to two alternates must be designated by the city council. When completing the attached Voting Delegate form, please attach either a copy of the council resolution that reflects the council action taken, or have your city clerk or mayor sign the form affirming that the names provided are those selected by the city council. Please note that designating the voting delegate and alternates must be done by city council action and cannot be accomplished by individual action of the mayor or city manager alone.
- Conference Registration Required. The voting delegate and alternates must be registered to attend the conference. They need not register for the entire conference; they may register for Friday only. Conference registration will open by the end of July at <a href="www.cacities.org">www.cacities.org</a>. In order to cast a vote, at least one voter must be present at the Business Meeting and in possession of the voting delegate card. Voting delegates and alternates need to pick up their conference badges before signing in and picking up the voting delegate card at the Voting Delegate Desk. This will enable them to receive the



#### **Annual Conference Voting Procedures**

- 1. **One City One Vote.** Each member city has a right to cast one vote on matters pertaining to League policy.
- 2. **Designating a City Voting Representative.** Prior to the Annual Conference, each city council may designate a voting delegate and up to two alternates; these individuals are identified on the Voting Delegate Form provided to the League Credentials Committee.
- 3. **Registering with the Credentials Committee.** The voting delegate, or alternates, may pick up the city's voting card at the Voting Delegate Desk in the conference registration area. Voting delegates and alternates must sign in at the Voting Delegate Desk. Here they will receive a special sticker on their name badge and thus be admitted to the voting area at the Business Meeting.
- 4. **Signing Initiated Resolution Petitions**. Only those individuals who are voting delegates (or alternates), and who have picked up their city's voting card by providing a signature to the Credentials Committee at the Voting Delegate Desk, may sign petitions to initiate a resolution.
- 5. **Voting.** To cast the city's vote, a city official must have in his or her possession the city's voting card and be registered with the Credentials Committee. The voting card may be transferred freely between the voting delegate and alternates, but may not be transferred to another city official who is neither a voting delegate or alternate.
- 6. **Voting Area at Business Meeting.** At the Business Meeting, individuals with a voting card will sit in a designated area. Admission will be limited to those individuals with a special sticker on their name badge identifying them as a voting delegate or alternate.
- 7. **Resolving Disputes.** In case of dispute, the Credentials Committee will determine the validity of signatures on petitioned resolutions and the right of a city official to vote at the Business Meeting.

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#### MINUTES OF THE FOWLER CITY COUNCIL SPECIAL MEETING JUNE 16, 2020

Mayor Cardenas called the meeting to order at 6:02 p. m. Roll call was taken.

# Discuss Proposed Traffic Improvements on Merced Street Business Corridor and Fresno Street (Donny Wright Park area)

City Engineer Peters said this is for open discussion for possibilities for traffic improvements for Merced Street corridor and Fresno Street, Donny Wright Park area. Mr. Peters, said citizens have voiced their concerns regarding issues with vehicles speeding on Fresno Street. He said speed bumps and four-way stops are not something they would want to be placed on this type of street classification. Four-way stops have been discussed in past meetings, but placing a four-way stop would only cause traffic issues. Mr. Peters said there are other traffic techniques that can be used such as construction of curb extensions (bulb outs) studies have shown that traffic tends to slow down if the roadway is narrowed down, this will also provide safety to pedestrians crossing the street.

Councilmember Kazarian said he would like to see more evidence on the effectiveness of curb extensions. He has been contacted by residents and they are interested in having speed bumps placed in the area. Mr. Peters suggested putting in speed tables; they differ from a speed bump in that they are longer and flatter and allow traffic to continue at a reasonable speed without too much jarring or discomfort. He said these are more effective when used in conjunction with the curb extensions. Councilmember Kazarian said he is more comfortable with that approach and this may also satisfy the concerns of the residents. Mayor Cardenas said he is in favor of having speed tables installed instead of the stop signs or speed bumps.

City Engineer Peters continued with discussion on proposed traffic improvements on Merced Street Business Corridor. He said this item has been discussed at prior meetings and the purpose of this discussion is to further determine what possible solutions can be implemented. He said with more developments more traffic growth is anticipated. Mr. Peters said in prior meetings discussion of the possibility of having a roundabout and traffic signals was not a good idea to place at 10<sup>th</sup> and Merced Street. Looking at other opportunities is to create a connection to Merced Street that could take traffic coming in from the sides and integrate that traffic into the Merced Street corridor as efficiently as possible. At the moment 9<sup>th</sup> and Merced is a two-way stop, which has its limitations, the more traffic on Merced Street the fewer gaps for those wanting to turn onto Merced Street. This will cause more back up on and the only way to prevent this is to place a four-way stop. The corridor has closely spaced intersections so putting in a four way stop has the ability to impact adjacent intersections, which would create corridor issues.

Other option would be to place a traffic signal but the most effective option in terms of capacity, safety, long term operation, and maintenance would be to place a roundabout. This would allow traffic to access on either side of Merced Street; it's the midway point between Highway 99 and Golden State Boulevard. There are other improvements that can be done to the corridor, there have been discussions about traffic signals in the past and that has not been ruled out. Mr. Peters said he is currently working with Caltrans to do analysis at Adams Avenue and SR 99 to find a solution for that location and is discussing 10<sup>th</sup> and Merced Street with Caltrans as a side to that area. Caltrans opposes the traffic signals at 10<sup>th</sup> and Merced because it would queue back into the freeway ramp. Their concern is that if there's a red light on Merced Street that traffic will back up blocking the ramps which will start backing up the mainlines of the freeway. If it gets to the point where there are difficulties making the left turn caused by backups on 10<sup>th</sup> Street medians could be placed in the roadway to preserve the left turns into La Quinta hotel and the Starbucks property from the freeway. At this point all of these options are suggested ideas to discuss and see what is best for this area.

Councilmember Parra said it was not too long ago that this discussion was brought up to place traffic signs in the area leading to different directions when the new Valley Children's' clinic was being built. Mr. Parra said with the traffic signal he agreed to have a roundabout only for the sole purpose of a U-turn. He said as far as a signal light, and it being within the City, Caltrans has issues placing one there, but on 10<sup>th</sup> street making a left going back onto the freeway as long as you have that short turn the buildup could be mitigated on Manning Avenue. Councilmember Parra expressed that he would like the original direction from the Council to take place. Councilmember Kazarian expressed his support for roundabouts that are properly placed but being so close to the future proposed roundabouts for Caltrans would be too close and would not be doable. By moving it over to 9th Street might solve the issue and will possibly tie in nicely with the Golden State Corridor improvement project. City Engineer Peters said there is a highway safety grant to do a corridor study; the first phase would be to come up with a concept, even though not everyone is in full agreement, if this may be heading in the right direction than this concept would be continued performing traffic analysis and provide and would be submitted to the Council for adoption, this would assist to seek funding with clear direction from the Council prior to submitting the grant application. A discussion took place on the concept for traffic improvements and what other strategies it would take to control the flow of traffic. The consensus of the Council is to work with Caltrans, include the stakeholders and discuss further and move forward with the corridor study for more than one option and bring it back to the Council for action.

# Approve Cooperative Agreement between Fresno County Fire Protection District and the City of Fowler

City Manager Davis said this is an annual agreement for the fire protection district's emergency dispatch services.

Councilmember Kazarian made a motion to approve Cooperative Agreement between Fresno County Fire Protection District and the City of Fowler, seconded by Mayor Pro Tem Hammer. The motion carried by roll call vote: Ayes: Cardenas, Hammer, Kazarian, Parra. Noes: None. Abstain: None. Absent: Rodriquez.

#### **ADJOURNMENT**

Having no further business, Mayor Pro Tem Hammer made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Kazarian to adjourn. The motion carried by roll call vote and the meeting adjourned at 7:00 p.m.

#### STAFF REPORTS

#### PLANNING DEPARTMENT REPORT

City Manager Davis said she and City Planner Marple have been working on a temporary use permit to allow for temporary outdoor seating in the Form Base Code Zone District to assist the local businesses with offering more seating, due to social distancing requirements related to Covid-19. Several designated areas have been looked at to allow required social distancing measures.

City Planner Marple said on Thursday, May 21<sup>st</sup>, the State gave Fresno County the green light to enter advanced stage 2, which allows some non-essential businesses to reopen, including dining rooms of restaurants. The City anticipates that many local restaurants will want to open with some sort of outdoor dining to add to takeout/delivery options, and will be looking at whether they can use part of the public sidewalks and alleys to set up outdoor seating with the required social distancing measures. Temporary use permit No. 20-01 would allow for temporary outdoor seating areas in the public right-of-way within the Form Based Code Zone District boundary. Duration of the temporary use permit would last until March 1, 2021, or at which time the State and County no longer recommended social distancing measures, whichever comes first. The fees for the encroachment permits would be waived during this time.

Councilmember Kazarian made a motion to adopt Resolution No. 2470, "A Resolution before the City Council of the City of Fowler County of Fresno, State of California Authorizing Temporary Use Permit For Outdoor Dining in the Form-Based Code Zone District Right-of-Way, seconded by Councilmember Parra. #### CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

#### **COVID-19 Update and Discussion**

City Manager Davis said escrow for United Health's purchase of the Grange property at 130 S. 6<sup>th</sup> Street has been completed.

She said she has been communicating with Recreation Coordinator, Yvonne Hernandez, on the possibility of having the Farmer's Market with changes necessary to follow physical distancing guidelines, and limited hours, food trucks and produce vendors only.

She also mentioned that City Engineer Peters applied for grant funding for the Maxco sidewalk project and it was approved.

Ms. Davis provided an update on current Covid cases in the City; there are 23 confirmed cases, 12 recovered, leaving 11 open cases remaining in the City. Fresno County Public Health department is developing door hangers to remind apartment complex residences of guidelines for social distancing.

Councilmember Kazarian said he has been proactive providing COVID updates and resources to the community. He said there's been discussion on the use of face masks and whether or not the City can do more to implement the use of wearing them. He expressed his concerns on the reopening of businesses and rising cases, it seems people are not being responsible and not practicing social distancing. A discussion took place on being more proactive in wearing masks but enforcing it may be an issue.

#### PUBLIC WORKS REPORT

Public Works Director Dominguez said some of the ponding basins have been mowed, and they are in the process of mowing the others.

He said the Tree Fresno project was completed last week.

#### FINANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Finance Director Uyeda said the State of California has granted extensions on some tax revenues and loss of sales tax revenues due to current events. He recommends delaying the fiscal year 2021 budget for another three months. Fowler is not the only City to request a delay in producing the FY 2020 budget, Fresno City for the first time in its history is also requesting the postponement as are several other cities.

#### POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

Police Chief Alcaraz said the protest on Saturday, June 13, 2020 was peaceful and a successful event for such short notice.

He said later that evening there was a double homicide associated with domestic violence. The Fresno County Sheriff's Office is handling the investigation.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

No report was given.

Councilmember Parra attended a virtual League of California Cities meeting on economic development post Covid.

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# A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FOWLER, COUNTY OF FRESNO, STATE OF CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING AN INTERIM CITY ANNUAL BUDGET AND APPROPRIATING REVENUE OF THE CITY FOR THE 2020-2021 FISCAL YEAR

WHEREAS, the City Manager has prepared and submitted to the City Council a proposed interim budget for the first three months of the 2020-2021 fiscal year, beginning July 1, 2020, which is a continuation of the adopted 2019-2020 budget approved on June 30, 2019 by Resolution No. 2437 with some finished capital expenditures removed; and

WHEREAS, the proposed budget is an interim budget due to the uncertainty in revenue estimation caused by the economic impact of the Governor's various orders to close numerous businesses for the stated purpose of trying to slow the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, the proposed budget was presented to and considered by the City Council during the July 21, 2020 City Council meeting and direction was given to the City Manager and Finance Director to include some additional items and/or amendments in the proposed budget.

WHEREAS, notwithstanding the economic uncertainty, the City Council finds and determines it is necessary for the efficient management of the City that certain sums of revenue be appropriated to various departments, offices, agencies, and activities of the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Fowler as follows:

**Section 1.** The document entitled "Annual Budget – Interim Fiscal Year 2020-2021" presented to the City Council at the July 14, 2020 City Council meeting, which document is incorporated herein by title reference only, is hereby adopted as the interim budget for the period of July 1, 2020 through and including September 30, 2020 of the 2020-2021 fiscal year for the period Fiscal Year, with the following listed additions and/or amendments, provided the additions and/or amendments do not result in the expenditure of funds not appropriated.

#### Additions/Amendments:

- 1. 2% COLA increase for City Employees effective August 1, 2020.
- 2. \$80,000 (an increase of \$5,000 over budgeted \$75,000) for purchase of emergency generator for Water Well.
- 3. \$15,000 for Fire Department lockers, hose racks, and SBA tank holders

**Section 2**. The following sums of money are hereby appropriated from the revenue of the City of Fowler for activities of the City, including transfers and capital projects during the 2020-2021 fiscal year.

General Fund	\$ 4,919,579
Special Revenue Funds	2,093,016
Water Enterprise Fund	1,406,052
Total Budget	\$ 8,418,647

**Section 3**. The final adopted interim budget document for the period of July 1, 2020 through and including September 30, 2020 of the 2020-2021 fiscal year shall contain all revisions approved by the City Council as listed in Section 1 above.

**Section 4**. The budget for the remaining portion of the 2020-2021 fiscal year shall be presented for approval at a duly noticed meeting of the City Council no later than September 30, 2020.
