APPROVE Resolution No. 2572, A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Fowler Authorizing Continued Use of Remote Teleconferencing for City Council Meetings and Commission Meetings During Declared Stare of Emergency in Accordance with Government Code Section 54953 as amended by AB 361

RECOMMENDATION

Approve Resolution No. 2572 if the City Council makes the findings required by Government Code Section 54953(e)(3) to continue to allow City Council members to attend City Council meetings via remote teleconferencing without following typical Brown Act requirements for teleconference participation by City Council members at City Council meetings. The Resolution also authorizes the City's other commissions to continue meeting remotely for as long as the City Council authorizes.

BACKGROUND

The City Council approved Resolution No. 2522 on October 19, 2021, authorizing remote teleconferencing for City Council and City commission meetings in accordance with Government Code Section 54953 as amended by AB 361 during the COVID-19 declared emergency. To continue with the "relaxed" remote teleconferencing for City Council and other commission meetings Government Code Section 54953 requires the City Council to make findings every 30 days that (1) it has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency, and either (a) the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person, or (b) state or local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing.

Fowler City Council meetings are currently conducted in a manner that allows the public and Council members to attend in person or via teleconference in compliance with applicable legal requirements. Approving this resolution would not change the way members of the public are allowed to participate in meetings (both in-person and teleconference attendance is allowed) and would also allow City Council members to continue to attend meetings via teleconference, if desired, without complying with the typical Brown Act requirements for teleconferencing attendance at City Council meetings.

The proclaimed COVID-19 emergency is still in effect and there may be occasions when the proclaimed emergency directly impacts the ability of members of the public or Council members to meet safely in person. Also, some state and local officials continue to recommend measures to promote social distancing. As a result, the necessary findings can be made, if desired, to continue with remote teleconferencing for City Council and other commission meetings. These findings must be made every 30 days to continue with the relaxed Brown Act teleconference requirements.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

This action does not constitute a "project" pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act.

FISCAL IMPACT

No fiscal impact is anticipated whether this Resolution is approved or not.

RESOLUTION NO. 2572

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FOWLER AUTHORIZING CONTINUED USE OF REMOTE TELECONFERENCING FOR CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS AND COMMISSION MEETINGS DURING DECLARED STATE OF EMERGENCY IN ACCORANCE WITH GOVENRMENT CODE SECTION 54953 AS AMENDED BY AB 361

- **WHEREAS**, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of California declared a state of emergency in the State as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic; and
- **WHEREAS**, pursuant to Resolution 2461, approved by the Fowler City Council on March 17, 2020, the City Council declared a local emergency as a result of the threatened spread of COVID-19 in the City, surrounding areas, and the state; and
- **WHEREAS**, on March 17, 2020, with the issuance of Executive Order N-29-20, the Governor suspended certain provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act in order to allow local legislative bodies to conduct meetings telephonically or by other remote means; and
- **WHEREAS**, on June 11, 2021, the Governor issued Executive Order N-08-21, which placed an end date of September 30, 2021, for agencies to meet remotely; and
- WHEREAS, AB 361 was enacted on September 16, 2021, enacting certain changes to the Brown Act for teleconferencing and remote participation at public meetings as set forth in Government Code Section 54953; and
- WHEREAS, the state of emergency proclaimed by the Governor on March 4, 2020, has not been rescinded and remains in effect; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City Council has determined that teleconferencing from remote locations by the public and City Council members has not limited participation of members of the public, Council members, or other attendees at City Council or other City commission meetings; and
- **WHEREAS**, on October 19, 2021, the City Council approved Resolution No. 2522 authorizing remote teleconferencing for City Council and City commission meetings in accordance with Government Code Section 54953 as amended by AB 361; and
- **WHEREAS,** Government Code Section 54953, as amended by AB 361, requires the City Council to make certain findings every 30 days after approving Resolution No. 2522 in order to continue with remote teleconferencing.
- **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the City Council of the City of Fowler as follows:
- 1. The City Council has reconsidered the circumstances of the COVID-19 state of emergency and finds that the following circumstances exist:

- A. The state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of members of the public, City Council members, and members of other City commissions to meet safely in person; and
- B. State or local officials continue to recommend measures to promote social distancing.
- 2. This Resolution shall be effective immediately and a similar resolution shall be a standing item on City Council meeting agendas each month to reconsider the circumstances of the COVID-19 state of emergency and determine whether the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of members of the public, City Council members, and members of other City commissions to meet safely in person, or whether state or local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing, until the necessary findings required for continuing remote teleconferencing are no longer approved by the City Council.

The California Energy Commission's "California Automated Permit Processing Program" will provide the City \$40,000 to implement SolarAPP+.

SolarAPP+ is a free cloud-based solution developed by the National Renewable Energy Laboratory. It performs automated plan review for residential solar projects, supports online fee payment, and immediate issuance of building permits and inspection cards. The award will help offset implementation costs including staff training, contractor training, hardware costs, and ongoing support needs.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

This does not constitute a "project" pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act.

FISCAL IMPACT

This grant will help reduce staff processing time of residential solar building permit applications.

SUBJECT

APPROVE the First Amendment to the Covenant and Agreement between the County of Fresno and the City of Fowler to accommodate the development of a second driveway, to be located on an adjacent City-owned property to provide for additional access to the Fowler Library.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the City Council approve the First Amendment to the Covenant and Agreement Regarding Joint-Use of Parking Lot and Storm Drainage Facilities between the County of Fresno and the City of Fowler ("Agreement") to accommodate the development of a second driveway, to be located on an adjacent City-owned property to provide for additional access to the Fowler Library, and authorize the City Manager, or her designee, to execute the First Amendment to the Agreement.

BACKGROUND

On September 11, 2007, the County of Fresno and the City of Fowler entered into the Agreement to address the rights and responsibilities of each of the parties regarding improvements to, and joint usage of, the public parking and storm drainage facilities located adjacent to the County-constructed Fowler Library.

Earlier this year, Mayor Cardenas had been in continuous communication with County Board Supervisor Mendes to help address an access issue to the library's parking lot. Both parties agreed to construct a second driveway to the west of the existing driveway. The Library will now have two (2) points of ingress and egress. The new drive approach will help alleviate traffic congestions and reduce safety concerns.

The project will be financed by the County, and construction is likely to begin later this summer.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

Executing the agreement with Fresno County is not considered a "project" as defined by Public Resources Code Section 21065 and CEQA Guidelines Section 15378. However, any future projects identified and agreed upon by Fresno County and the City of Fowler in compliance with the agreement will prepare an environmental document pursuant to the CEQA Guidelines.

FISCAL IMPACT

The County of Fresno has agreed to pay all costs and expenses associated with any work performed by its contractor for the improvements to the Library parking lot.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST

Staff is not aware of any conflicts of interest.

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FIRST AMENDMENT TO COVENANT AND AGREEMENT REGARDING JOINT-USE OF PARKING LOT AND STORM DRAINANGE FACILITIES BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF FRESNO AND THE CITY OF FOWLER

This First Amendment to the Covenant and Agreement Regarding Joint-Use of Parking Lot and Storm Drainage Facilities ("First Amendment"), executed on this _____ day of ______, 2022 ("Effective Date"), amends the Covenant and Agreement Regarding Joint-Use of Parking Lot and Storm Drainage Facilities ("Covenant and Agreement"), executed on September 11, 2007, by and between the County of Fresno, a political subdivision of the State of California ("County"), and the City of Fowler, a municipal corporation of the State of California ("City"). County and City are each a "Party" to this First Amendment, and are collectively "the Parties".

RECITALS:

WHEREAS, the Parties previously entered into the Covenant and Agreement, dated September 11, 2007, to address the rights and responsibilities of each of the Parties regarding improvements to and joint usage of public parking and storm drainage facilities located adjacent to the County-constructed Fowler Library, located within the city limits of the City of Fowler; and

WHEREAS, this First Amendment to the Covenant and Agreement is necessary and desirable to accommodate development of a new (second) driveway, to be located on adjacent City-owned land, for the purpose of providing additional access to the Fowler Library public parking lot.

NOW, THEREFORE, County and City hereby agree as follows:


- 1. The site plan, included as Attachment 1.1, and attached and incorporated by this reference, shall replace Attachment 1 to the Covenant and Agreement as of the Effective Date of this First Amendment.
- 2. The fourth recital of the Covenant and Agreement, on page 1, lines 18-19, is deleted, and replaced with the following:

"WHEREAS, COUNTY will construct parking lot, driveway approaches, and storm drainage improvements, hereinafter referred to as "Improvements."

- 3. Section 1 of the Covenant and Agreement is deleted, and replaced with the following:
 "1. RIGHT OF ENTRY CITY agrees to allow the COUNTY to enter upon and have ingress to and egress from CITY properties located adjacent to the Library for the purposes of construction of (A) a parking lot to be located on land within CITY jurisdiction;
 (B) storm drainage improvements as more thoroughly described herein below, directing water run-off from the parking lot and Library to CITY storm drainage basin facility, and
 (C) development of two driveway approaches, to be located on adjacent City-owned land, for the purpose of providing access to the Fowler Library public parking lot, as depicted on Attachment 1.1."
- 4. Section 2 of the Covenant and Agreement is deleted, and replaced with the following: "2. CONSTRUCTION – CITY agrees to allow the COUNTY and its contractor to construct a parking lot containing thirty-eight (38) parking spaces, as well as two driveway approaches for access to this parking lot, on a portion of the City's property adjacent to the Library, and to construct storm drainage inlets and piping from the parking lot and the Library to the City's property being used as a storm drainage basin (see Attachment 1.1). COUNTY agrees to pay all costs and expenses associated with any work performed by its contractor for the Improvements. COUNTY will obtain all necessary permits to perform Improvement work. COUNTY and CITY agree to work cooperatively with respect to inspection and approval of the Improvements, as more thoroughly provided below."
- Unless expressly modified by the terms of this First Amendment, all other terms of the
 Covenant and Agreement remain in full force and effect.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommend the City Council:

- APPROVE Resolution No. 2573, a resolution directing the City Engineer to initiate and prepare the Engineer's Report for landscaping and storm drainage facilities maintenance district no. 1 for fiscal year 2022-2023.
- Approve the Engineer's Report on file with the City Clerk.
- APPROVE Resolution No 2574 a resolution of the City's intention to levy and collect the annual assessment of the Landscape and Storm Drainage Facilities Maintenance District No. 1, for fiscal year 2022-2023, and to set a public hearing for August 2, 2022.

BACKGROUND

The City provides for the operations and maintenance of landscaping and storm drainage facilities within various improved developments throughout the City of Fowler. The City's Landscape and Storm Drainage Facilities Maintenance District No. 1 ("LSDFMD No. 1") was formed pursuant to the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 (the "Act") and provides for assessing parcels within these developed areas to fund these maintenance and operations activities.

Actions pertaining to Landscape and Storm Drainage Facilities Maintenance District No. 1 Annual Assessments – Intent to Levy July 5, 2022

Page 2

To initiate this process for the levy of the annual assessment, the City Council must first adopt a resolution ordering the City Engineer to prepare an Engineer's Report for consideration by the City Council. The City Council must approve the Engineer's Report annually, which describes the improvements to be maintained and the costs and proposed assessments to be levied on the properties within LSDFMD No. 1. Approval of the levy of the annual assessment must be completed by the City Council after conducting a public hearing at a regular meeting, prior to August 10, 2022.

The City Council should approve Resolution No. 2573, ordering the City Engineer to prepare an Engineer's Report for fiscal year 2022-2023, in accordance with Streets and Highways Code section 22622. The City Engineer has prepared and filed the report with the City Clerk. The City Council should consider and approve the Engineer's Report for fiscal year 2022-2023.

Exhibit A of the Engineer's Report generally describes the area to be benefitted by the LSDFMD No. 1. There are no new improvements or substantial changes in LSDFMD No. 1 from the previous year. The City Council should approve Resolution No. 2574, adopting the Engineer's Report, declaring its intent to levy the annual assessment, and set a public hearing for the adoption of a resolution approving the levy of the annual assessment for LSDFMD No. 1 for the regular City Council Meeting on August 2, 2022.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

This action does not constitute a "project" pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act.

FISCAL IMPACT

Per the Engineer's Report attached hereto for the 2022-2023 fiscal year, the annual assessments for LSDFMD No. 1 remain unchanged from the previous year's report.

I, David Peters, Engineer for the City of Fowler, Landscaping and Storm Drainage Facilities Maintenance District No. 1, hereby submit the Engineer's Report of said project as follows:

A. Plans and Specifications

The Plans and Specifications for the landscaping and storm drainage improvements to be serviced and maintained are incorporated herein by reference to construction items as listed and enumerated in the documents entitled:

The Plans and Specifications for the Development of Tract No. 3997, Tract No. 4055, Tract No. 4128, Tract No. 4552, Tract No. 4571, Tract No. 4572, Parcel Map No. 95-2, Tract No. 4887, Tract No. 4994, Tract No. 5041, Tract No. 5042, Tract No. 5088, Tract 5090, Tract 5198, Tract No. 5212, Tract No. 5280, Tract 5779, Tract 5834, Tract 6157, and Tract 6259.

The improvements consist of landscaping, drainage pipelines and lagoon disposal and appurtenances and irrigation systems on East Sumner Avenue serving Tract No. 3997 and 4055, on South Avenue serving Tract No. 4128, on Harris Avenue serving Tract No. 4552 and Parcel Map No. 95-2, on South Avenue serving Tract No. 4571, on Temperance Avenue serving Tract No. 4572, on East Sumner Avenue, Magnolia Avenue, Palm Avenue, Aspen Avenue, Maple Avenue and Stanford Avenue service and block wall on East Sumner Avenue and Magnolia Avenue serving Tract No. 4887 and Tract No. 4994, on Maple Avenue, Palm Court, West Fresno Street and Fowler Avenue serving Tract No. 5042, on East Sumner Avenue and Sunnyside Avenue serving Tract No. 5041, on Adams Avenue and South Temperance Avenue serving Tract No. 5088, on South Temperance Avenue and East Clayton Avenue serving Tract No. 5090, on East South Avenue and South Sunnyside Avenue serving Tract No. 5198, on East Sumner Avenue and South Sunnyside Avenue serving Tract No. 5212 and Tract No. 5779, on South Temperance Avenue serving Tract No. 5280, on East South Avenue and South Sunnyside Avenue serving Tract No. 5198, on East Clayton Avenue and South Temperance Avenue serving Tract No. 5090, on East South Avenue, South Sunnyside Avenue, and Stanford Avenue serving Tract No. 5834, on East Clayton Avenue and South Armstrong Avenue serving Tract No. 6157, and on South Sunnyside Avenue and Stanford Avenue serving Tract No. 6259.

ACTIONS pertaining to annexation of Tracts 5952, 6188, and 6274 into the City's Landscape and Storm Drainage Facilities Maintenance District No. 1.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommend that the City Council:

- APPROVE Resolution No 2575 a resolution to initiate proceedings to annex tracts 5952, 6188, and 6274 into the City's Landscape and Storm Drainage Facilities Maintenance District No. 1 and order the preparation of an Engineer's Report regarding said annexation.
- APPROVE the Engineer's Report on file with the City Clerk.
- APPROVE Resolution No. 2576 a resolution to consider and approve the Engineer's Report, a
 declaration of the City's intent to annex tracts 5952, 6188, and 6274 into the City's Landscape
 and Storm Drainage Facilities Maintenance District No. 1, set a public hearing on the annexation,
 order assessment ballots to be mailed to all property owners of record of the parcels within tracts
 5952, 6188, and 6274, and to set a public hearing on the annexation of the tracts into the City's
 Landscape and Storm Drainage Facilities Maintenance District No. 1, for September 6, 2022.

BACKGROUND

The City provides for the operations and maintenance of landscaping and storm drainage facilities within various improved developments throughout the City of Fowler. The City's Landscape and Storm Drainage Facilities Maintenance District No. 1 ("LSDFMD No. 1"), was formed pursuant to the

Actions pertaining to annexation of Tracts 5952, 6188, and 6274 in the City's Landscape and Storm Drainage Facilities Maintenance District No. 1

Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 ("Act"), which provides for assessing parcels within these developed areas to fund these maintenance and operations activities.

The Act allows for newly developed properties to be annexed into an existing landscape and maintenance district. (Streets and Highways Code § 22605, subd. (a).) In accordance with the conditions for approval for tracts 5952, 6188, and 6274 (hereinafter collectively referred to as, the "Tracts") these subdivisions must be annexed into the City's LSDFMD No. 1. To initiate proceedings for the annexation, the City Council must adopt a resolution describing the improvements and services within LSDFMD No. 1, describe the territory to be annexed, describe the proposed assessment on the proposed annexation, and to order the City Engineer to draft and file with the City Clerk an Engineer's Report in accordance with Streets and Highways Code section 22567.

The City Engineer has already prepared and filed the Engineer's Report for the Tracts to be annexed into LSDFMD No. 1. After the City considers and approves the Engineer's Report, it must then adopt another resolution declaring its intent to approve the annexation and set a public hearing in accordance with the provisions of Government Code section 53753. This requires the City to provide notice and assessment ballots to the owners of record for the parcels within the Tracts and must be mailed to the property owners of the Tracts at least forty-five (45) days prior to the public hearing.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

This action does not constitute a "project" pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act.

FISCAL IMPACT

If the territory is approved to be annexed, each parcel in the annexed Tracts would be annually assessed and the revenue from the assessments will help pay the annual maintenance costs associated with the new improvements.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Part 2 of Division 15 of the Streets and Highways Code, the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 ("Act"), the City Council of the City of Fowler duly formed the Landscaping and Storm Drainage Facilities Maintenance District No. 1 of the City of Fowler ("LSDFMD No. 1") on March 12, 1985; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has thereafter levied and collected annual assessments for the maintenance and operation of the landscaping facilities in LSDFMD No. 1; and

WHEREAS, the owners of Tracts 5952, 6188, and 6274 are required to annex the aforementioned Tracts into LSDFMD No. 1, pursuant to the conditions of approval for the Tracts.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Fowler hereby resolves as follows:

- 1. The City Council hereby proposes annexation of Tracts 5952, 6188, and 6274 into LSDFMD No. 1, and to initiate and conduct proceedings pursuant to the Act for the purpose of levying an annual assessment on all the parcels within the Tracts.
- 2. The boundaries of the proposed annexation into LSDFMD No. 1 shall include all of the property as shown and described in Exhibit A, attached hereto.
- 3. RESOLUTION NO. 2576

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FOWLER ADOPTING THE ENGINEER'S REPORT; DECLARING ITS INTENT TO ORDER THE ANNEXATION OF TRACT 5952, TRACT 6188, AND TRACT 6274 INTO THE CITY'S LANDSCAPING AND STORM DRAINAGE FACILITIES MAINTENANCE DISTRICT NO 1; GIVING NOTICE SETTING THE TIME AND PLACE OF THE PUBLIC HEARING ON THE ANNEXATION; AND ORDERING AN ASSESSMENT PROCEEDING AND BALLOT PROCEEDING TO BE CONDUCTED BY MAIL.

WHEREAS, the City Council has adopted Resolution No. 2575, on July 5, 2022, initiating proceedings for the annexation of Tracts 5952, 6188, and 6274 (hereinafter collectively referred to as "Tracts"), and ordering the City Engineer to prepare an Engineer's Report for the properties to be annexed into the City's Landscaping and Storm Drainage Facilities Maintenance District No. 1 ("LSDFMD No. 1") of the City of Fowler, County of Fresno, pursuant to the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, the City Council did thereafter designate and order the City Engineer, to prepare an Engineer's Report regarding the annexation of the Tracts into LSDFMD No. 1, and the assessments to be levied within the Tracts each fiscal year. The Engineer's Report was filed with the City Clerk and has been considered and approved by the City Council, which is incorporated herein; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that the City Council adopt a resolution of intention pursuant to California Streets and Highways Code section 22587, which fixes and gives notice, pursuant to Streets and Highways Code section 22588, of the time and place of a public hearing on said annexation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Fowler hereby resolves as follows:

- 1. The City Engineer has prepared and filed with the Clerk of the City of Fowler an Engineer's Report dated June 2022, and is incorporated by reference herein. The Engineer's Report provides for the description of the improvements, the boundaries of the assessment district and any zones therein (including the general location), and the proposed assessment upon the Tracts that are being annexed into LSDFMD No. 1.
- 2. The City Council hereby declares its intention to order the annexation of the Tracts, as described by the Engineer's Report, into LSDFMD No. 1, and to levy and collect an annual assessment on all assessable lots and parcels of property within the Tracts, commencing with fiscal year 2022-2023.
- 3. That on Tuesday, **September 6, 2022, at 7:00 p.m.**, or as soon thereafter as possible, at the City of Fowler Council Chambers, 128 South 5th Street, Fowler, California, is the time and place set for the public hearing of all persons interested in or objection to the proposed annexation of the Tracts into LSDFMD No. 1.
- 4. Each owner of record of the properties identified within the Tracts, are to receive by mail an assessment ballot that shall conform to the requirements set forth in California

- Government Code section 53753. The assessment ballots are to be returned prior to the above-referenced public hearing.
- 5. Notice of Public Hearing regarding the annexation of the Tracts into LSDFMD No. 1, shall be provided in accordance with Streets and Highways Code sections 22608 and 22588, and Government Code section 53753.
 - a. The City Clerk shall provide notice of the Public Hearing by causing a certified copy of this Resolution of Intent to be published once in a newspaper of general circulation at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the Public Hearing, in accordance with Streets and Highways Code sections 22552 and 22553, and Government Code section 6061.
 - b. Notice of Public Hearing shall also be given by first-class mail, postage prepaid, those notices, as prepared by the City Attorney, assessment ballot and information sheets as required by Government Code section 53753, to all owners of record for the properties within the Tracts, as shown on the last equalized assessment roll of the County of Fresno. Mailing is to be made by the City Engineer, and deposited with the U.S. Post Office at least forty-five (45) days prior to the Public Hearing on September 6, 2022.

YOUTH RECREATIONAL FUNDING PROGRAM GUIDELINES

APRIL 2010

1. BACKGROUND AND PURPOSE

It has been the practice of the City Council to consider and contribute to the funding of local youth recreational programs conducted by non-profit organizations. The purpose of these Guidelines is to formalize the process for the granting of an award of monetary support to local non-profit organizations whose programs provide youth recreational activities for Fowler residents. Funding provided pursuant to these Guidelines is not intended for use as the sole or primary support of any organization.

2. <u>ELIGIBILITY</u>

Applicants must meet the following criteria:

- 2.1. Be formally incorporated as a non-profit entity and be tax exempt (under section 501(c)(3) of the IRS Code and section 2370(d) of the California Revenue and Taxation Code).
- 2.2. Be based in Fowler or provide services in Fowler to a significant Fowler client base.
- 2.3. Provide a service that is not a duplication of an existing public sector program, OR if the service is duplicated, the applicant must show why it is not an unnecessary duplication of service.
- 2.4. Maintain accounting records which are in accordance with generally accepted accounting practices.
- 2.5. Have bylaws that define the organization's purposes and functions, its organization, and the duties, authority and responsibilities of its governing body and officers.
- 2.6. Provide for adequate administration of the program to insure delivery of the services. One individual should be designated as the full time director of the organization whom shall be the primary contact person with the City.
- 2.7. Use at least 95% of City funds granted for direct services as opposed to administrative costs.
- 2.8. Implement programs that emphasize youth recreational programs for Fowler residents.

3. PROCEDURE

Applicant's shall file an application for Community Youth Organization Funding with the City Clerk. Application forms may be obtained from City Hall or off the City's web page at www.ci.fowler.ca.us. The City Manager is responsible for reviewing all proposals and submitting recommendations for funding to the City Council. In its evaluation, the City Manager shall consider and evaluate the following criteria:

- 3.1. The non-profit status of the organization.
- 3.2. The number of citizens within the community that will benefit directly by the expenditure as well as the ratio of Fowler residents served to the total number of individuals served.
- 3.3. Adherence to these Guidelines, City ordinances, and other stated policies of the City.
- 3.4. Whether or not a public need will go unmet without the contribution.
- 3.5. The degree to which the goodwill of the City will be promoted.
- 3.6. The degree to which the cause has been recognized as a contribution to the community.
- 3.7. Whether of not the contribution could expose the City to civil liability.
- 3.8. The amount of the request.
- 3.9. The degree to which the members of the organization have engaged in fundraising activities.
- 3.10. The percentage of the organization's operating budget that consists of City funds. Having an operating budget that relies too heavily on City funding will be evaluated lower.

4. **<u>FUNDING</u>**.

- 4.1. No organization may apply for funding if it failed to meet any of the post funding application requirements from the prior year (see section 5 below).
- 4.2. Funds will not be allocated to:
 - Political action committees, political candidates, or political campaigns.
 - Any organization conducting a religious activity.
 - For the rental of City facilities.

- For school district programs and/or projects.
- 4.3. Funding requested from membership based organizations will not be considered if the funds requested are to be used to directly benefit its members and not the community at large.
- 4.4. Funding of a program will not constitute a precedent for contributions in subsequent years.
- 4.5. Final funding decisions will be at the discretion of the City Council and will vary depending on budgetary considerations. Grants are funded primarily from the recreation portion of the City's Utility Users Tax. Absent special circumstances, the cumulative grants in any fiscal year should not exceed 15% of the recreation portion of the Utility Users Tax and the maximum contribution per organization should not exceed \$2000.

5. <u>POST FUNDING APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS</u>.

If funding is approved by the City Council, the non-profit organization shall comply with the following:

- 5.1. Carry adequate liability insurance naming the City as additional insured as may be required by the City.
- 5.2. Not unlawfully discriminate in employment or in clients served because of race, religion, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, disability, or any other class protected by the United States or California Constitution, or Federal or State statute.
- 5.3. Be accountable for revenue and expenditures through standard bookkeeping procedures. An annual review at the applicant's expense may be required, with the results available to the City of Fowler upon request.
- 5.4. Provide access to periodic reviews by City staff and City Council for purposes of monitoring the program.
- 5.5. Annual Programs. For recreational programs that run throughout the year, provide the City with an interim six-month and an end-of-the-year full financial accounting and narrative report.

The interim six-month report shall be submitted in writing, and may be brief but should include a financial summary indicating how funds have been expended during the period and a narrative commenting on development of the program.

The end-of-the-year report shall be in writing and submitted within 60 days after the one-year grant period. This report must include a complete financial

statement detailing all expenditures of City monies for the program(s) covered under the grant and a narrative report on the project and its significance. The financial and narrative report should compare actual expenditures and accomplishments with the budget and objectives cited in the original proposal.

<u>Seasonal Programs</u>. For recreational programs that are seasonal, in lieu of the interim six-month and end-of-year report, the non-profit organization may provide a report within 30 days after the end of the program meeting the criteria of the end-of-year report.

- 5.6. Funded applicants must return to the City any unexpended funds at the end of the one-year funding period for annual programs and at the end of the seasonal program for seasonal programs, or whenever the City determines that the applicant has not performed in accordance with the approved program proposal.
- 5.7. City monies shall be used only for the purpose and program duly authorized and in accordance with the approved budget. Any deviation from the approved program may be made only with the City's prior written approval. If not, funds must be returned immediately to the City.



CENTRAL VALLEY YOUTH FOOTBALL LEAGUE 2019 BY - LAWS

(Re-formatted from 2015 version)



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ARTICLE I - ORGANIZATION

GOVERNING BODY:

- 1. The Central Valley Youth Football League Board of Director— shall consist of two representatives from each affiliated organization. The affiliated organizations as of this revision are as follows: Caruthers Youth Football, Fowler Youth Football, Parlier Youth Football, Selma Bandits Youth Football, Riverdale Youth Football, Laton Youth Football, Visalia Youth Football, Reedley Youth Football, and Visalia Enforcers Association Youth Football, Minarets Youth Football, Yosemite Youth Football, Sierra Youth Football
- 2. For voting purposes each affiliate organization shall have two votes to cast on all business brought before this Central Valley Youth Football Board. Only officially recognized Representatives can cast the vote of an affiliated organization. Representatives may be changed by an affiliate organization at any time for good cause.
- 3. The Secretary of the board must be notified prior to the next meeting of the board as to any representative changes by an affiliate organization, so that the new representative will be recognized in voting matters.
- 4. The offices of President and Vice President shall be filled on a yearly rotational basis of a representative of one of the affiliated organizations. The affiliate organization whose representative holds the office of Vice President, shall appoint a representative of its organization to serve as President the following year. As of the printing of these bylaws the rotation is as follows:
 - Caruthers
 - Fowler
 - Selma
 - Riverdale(President 2019)
 - Laton
 - Minarets
 - Parlier
 - Sierra
 - Yosemite
 - 5. This Board of Directors shall have within its body an Executive Board, consisting of, the President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, two Commissioners and one Representative at Large. The offices of Secretary, Treasurer and Commissioners are elected by the Board of Directors. The Representative at Large shall be appointed by the Executive Board. The purpose of the Executive Board is to investigate any and all proposals, improprieties and other business brought forth to the Central Valley Youth Football League. The Executive Board shall investigate any and all violations of the bylaws, rules and regulations, brought before them or found by them. The Executive Board shall enforce these by-laws and the penalties within said bylaws or set forth a reasonable punishment where no written penalties exist. The Executive Boards judgment is final.
 - 6. An Executive board decision on by-law violations which have printed penalties cannot be overturned. All other decisions may be overturned by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Directors. All elected and appointed officials are for one year terms. Any officer may be removed by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Directors. In the event that an officer becomes unable to serve, a new officer shall be appointed by a majority vote of the Board of Directors.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE OFFICERS:

PRESIDENT: The President shall preside over all meetings of the Board of Directors and the Executive Board. He shall only cast a vote on matters before the boards in the event of a tie vote.

VICE PRESIDENT: The Vice President shall serve on the Executive Board and, in the absence of the President, preside over all meetings.

SECRETARY: The Secretary shall keep an accurate record of all meetings of the Board of Directors and the Executive Board, handle all correspondence, give notice of meetings, and maintain the files of the league.

TREASURER: The Treasurer shall give a report of all money which shall be deposited in the recognized bank in the name of the league. All accounts shall be paid by check and shall bear the signature of the Treasurer, President, Vice President or Secretary. The receipt book and vouchers shall be properly balanced according to the bank book or the bank statement, whichever is up to date. The Treasurer shall be responsible for the preparation of any and all papers pursuant to the tax exempt status and Insurance of this league.

COMMISSIONERS and MEMBER AT LARGE: These officers shall serve on the Executive Board and be responsible to be the first line of investigation of wrong doing or of by-law violations. They shall compile all pertinent evidence, statements and materials and prepare a report to the Executive Board.

ORGANIZATION INFORMATION:

- 1. The accounting record shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting practices.
- 2. A meeting called by the President may consist of a regular meeting or an Executive Board meeting.
- A quorum shall be a simple majority of representatives of affiliated organizations at a regular meeting or a simple majority of Executive Board members at an Executive Board meeting. Regular attendance is required in order to address matters affecting the league as a whole.

Penalty: Any community that does not have at least one (1) representative at more than two consecutive meetings will be fined \$100.

- 4. All decisions are decided upon by a majority vote of the quorum present, except in cases where a two-thirds vote is needed.
- 5. This association shall not assume, nor be liable for, the debts and/or the financial responsibilities, either implied or incurred, of any player, coach, manager, team assistant, league official or referee from any member affiliate team, league or organization.
- 6. The constitution, by-laws, rules and/or regulations of affiliate organizations, may not be in conflict with the by-laws, rules and regulations of the Central Valley Youth Football League.
- 7. The creation of a division outside the framework of the existing conference requires a two-thirds of the quorum at a regular meeting prior to the April regular meeting to be in place for the next football season.
- 8. The league must annually adopt a schedule of games for its team membership to determine its annual champion.
- 9. A Facebook page will host announcements and will be called CVYFL 559.

ANNUAL PARTICIPATION OF A TEAM WITH THE CVYFL:

- 1. Teams intending to participate in the CVYFL as of December 31st must deliver through their team representative, to the President at the January meeting, their intent to affiliate with the CVYFL. Team representatives will cover all teams within the affiliate organization.
- 2. Newly organized teams must deliver their request to the affiliate through their affiliate representative to the President by the March meeting. Any team or organization that wants to affiliate with the CVYFL after the March meeting must have two-thirds vote in favor to be able to be recognized.
- 3. All teams will submit their letter intent to participate in writing and will contain the following information: Team Name, Team Colors, Team Mascot, Address of practices, Address of Games
- 4. The geographical boundaries of each team and/or affiliate organization must be filed with the league

secretary by the March meeting.

Penalty: \$100.00 fine and loss of voting rights till boundaries are filed and fine is paid.

ARTICLE II - TEAM ORGANIZATION & REGISTRATION

TEAM ORGANIZATION & CERTIFICATION:

- Associations, sponsors, booster clubs, and/or any and all groups of individuals directly or indirectly affiliated
 with the CVYFL and any of its teams may not adopt constitutions, by-laws, rules or regulations, conduct their
 business or otherwise act in a manner or for aims and purposes that are in conflict with the by-laws, rules and
 regulations of the CVYFL.
- 2. Any team or organization after the January regular meeting that wants to join the CVYFL must have a two-thirds vote in order to be accepted and recognized.
- 3. The transfer of a team from one division to another division requires a two-thirds vote of the quorum present at a regular meeting prior to the April regular meeting to be in place for the next football season. It becomes effective upon the approval of the transfer.
- 4. An affiliate organization or its teams must recruit its players from within its prescribed boundaries. Each team has to field the first 16 players from within their boundaries. After the first 16 players a team can accept players from out of district until they reach a total of 24 players. However, if additional players within the district sign up, and equal number of players from out of district must be removed/dropped. All out of district players are subject to CVYFL Board approval each year for continued participation. No High School students are eligible for CVYFL play.
 - Penalty: first offense, removal of illegal players and forfeiture of any games in which the players participated and one game suspension of the head coach; second offense, removal of illegal players and forfeiture of any games in which players participated and a one season suspension of the head coach; third offense, removal of illegal players and forfeiture of any games in which players participated, banishment from the league of the head coach, and possible investigation of the affiliate organization.
- 5. Should an opposing team desire to challenge a players age or eligibility to participate with a team because of school attendance or boundaries, the representative responsible for that player must show proof of age and/or school attendance at the next scheduled regular meeting. If deemed necessary, the Executive Board may call an emergency meeting to settle the issue. It is the responsibility of the player(s) in questions team to ascertain to the certified team roster.
- 6. All players must have board permission to play for a team other than the affiliate organization which encompasses the school of which they attend.
 - Penalty: if a player is found to be participating with a team outside his or her—school boundaries, without prior Board approval, that player shall be deemed ineligible to participate for the balance of the current season. Furthermore, it is determined by an Executive Board investigation that a representative of that affiliate organization had knowledge of this ineligible participation, then that team for which the ineligible player played will be made to forfeit all games in which the said player participated. Also if found of this wrong doing, said team will be deemed ineligible for post season play.
- 7. Players with special circumstances may be brought before the board for approval to play for a team outside his or her boundaries or school.
- 8. Taxi or reserve squads are expressly prohibited. The division of a team into varsity and junior varsity teams is expressly prohibited. The objective to have all players on a squad participate in all games is defeated with the establishment of taxi or reserve squads, varsity or junior varsity team(s). The required establishment of an additional team(s) obviously must be pursued by the team and affiliate organization when the equipment and/or funds to purchase same are available.

Penalty: first offense, forfeiture of games while this act took place; second offense, Suspension of the team and/or affiliate organization for one season; third offense, Banishment from the league and/or affiliate organization.

- 9. Any team(s), affiliate organization, booster club, sponsor or association that violates the CVYFL by-laws, rules and/or regulations will be subject to the following.
 - Penalty: first offense, denied the right to engage in post season play and/or be required to forfeit games during the current season, second offense, banishment of the affiliate organization from the league based upon substantial allegations of wrong doing by order of the Executive Board.
- 10. Player rosters and contracts must be turned in to the league Secretary upon certification, as noted under **TEAM ORGANIZATION/CERTIFICATION**, to be reviewed by the Executive Board.
- 11. All teams must have completed contracts by carnival scrimmage date for proof of physical and parental approval and medical release in case of injury and for insurance purposes.
- 12. Penalty: \$100.00 fine per team offense and a one game suspension for each player with an incomplete contract as specified above.
- 13. Player contracts will be brought in for certification the week following the third game, at a time and place set forth by the Executive Board. Only Executive Board members can complete certification of a teams player contracts.

Penalty: if a team(s) does not bring in their player contracts to the place and time set forth by the Executive Board, then that team(s) will not be eligible to participate in their next regular game(s), which then would be declared a forfeit. Team(s) not attending the time and place set forth by the Executive Board will be fined \$100.00 and lose voting privileges until the fine is paid. They however may set-up a time with an Executive Board member to certify contracts before their next scheduled game to become eligible for that game and not have to forfeit.

- 14. Prior to the first game of the season, the team will enter all players' names and information to the team roster. The team cannot list candidates that are ineligible under Article 1 hereof or that have been cut from the squad by the head coach. Only a head coach can cut a candidate from the squad and this must be done in private and thoroughly explained to the player and his parent(s) or guardian(s).
- 15. The team roster shall be on forms provided by the secretary of the league and shall be prepared in a sufficient number to allow delivery of one to the secretary and in such numbers that meet the requirements of the CVYFL. Copies of each player's contract, both front and back must be included with the roster delivered to the secretary. Rosters and contract copies are to be turned into the league secretary the week prior to the first game, at a site and time determined by the Executive Board.

Penalty: failure to turn in the copies of the rosters and contracts at the site and time set by the Board will result in a \$100.00 fine and suspension of voting rights until the fine is paid. Also non-compliant teams will be ineligible for their next game(s), which would then be declared a forfeit.

TEAM REGISTRATION:

- All player candidates must register with their team prior to the player's commencement of practice. At that time
 the candidate must deliver to any team representative the items required in by-laws, Article I and fees as may
 be required by the team.
- 2. The spokesman for the teams at the time of sign-ups and/or registration are required to be very specific in replying to the questions from the players and/or parent(s) or guardian(s) as to all uses to which the registration fee will be put, the CVYFL by-laws, rules and regulations and their concern to said parent(s) or guardian(s).
- 3. The week following the third game, at a place and time set forth by the Executive Board, each team must certify its player's contracts with the league. The team roster verified by the team representative or his authorized representative shall serve as the form to affect the team's registration of players with the CVYFL.

Penalty: failure to comply will incur the penalties as set forth in Article I of these by-laws.

4. There will be no additions to the team roster after the third game of the season.

INSURANCE REQUIRED ALLOWING REGISTRATION:

- 5. All teams are required to carry Bodily Injury Liability, Property Damage Liability & Accidental-Medical Insurance coverage. The minimum amount of insurance per type of coverage per team for a minimum period of twelve months preceding the regular January meeting. The minimum Accidental-Medical Insurance must:
- 6. Cover injuries sustained while engaged in the play of football during a scheduled game or practice or in the participation of other CVYFL activities and while traveling directly to and from a scheduled game or practice or other CVYFL activity.
- 7. Cover all candidate players, otherwise known as tryouts, players, cheerleaders, pep squad, coaches, scouts, managers, trainers and duly authorized volunteer workers, all officially connected with the insured team.
- 8. The insurance must be effective as of the day proceeding the first day of official league practices and must not terminate prior to the day following the last official league or CVYFL approved bowl or post-season game.
- 9. The CVYFL Treasurer shall be responsible for all insurance matters at the league level. The Treasurer shall be responsible for all insurance matters within the league.
- 10. League fees and insurance must be paid by our May meeting.

Penalty: \$100.00 fine for each mouth the fees are late.

Rules & Regulations

ARTICLE III - ADULTS

COACHING STAFF:

- 1. Adult team coaching personnel shall consist of a maximum of ten (10) adults allowed on the sideline: one head coach, who is of at least twenty-one years of age, eight assistant coaches, and one trainer/medical personnel who are of at least eighteen years of age. The teams coaching staff; under the direction of the head coach, shall be responsible for training and organizing the team and directing its play. All head coaches and assistant coaches must sign the Coaches Code of Ethics, to be turned in to the Executive Board at the same time as player's contracts.
- 2. The head coach is solely responsible for which players play in each game and the position each will play. The head coach is expected to consult with his assistant coaches in this matter.
- 3. Head coaches and/or Managers must be at least twenty-one years of age. Assistant coaches must be at least eighteen years of age. All must be of unquestionable moral character and with the exception of municipally sponsored programs, shall serve on a non-compensated basis.
- 4. All coaches and managers shall not smoke, use smokeless tobacco or use excessive profanity, while with the players on the field, in the locker room or in conjunction with a practice session or game.
 - Penalty: first offense, one game suspension for violating coach or manager; second offense, suspension for the balance of the current season; third offense, suspension for the next full season.
- 5. Only the coaching staff, limited to ten (10) adults (including trainer/medical personnel), and two water boys of playing age or younger, may be in the bench area during any given game.

- Penalty: first offense, one game suspension for the head coach; second offense, two game suspension for the head coach; third offense, head coach suspended for the remainder of the season.
- 6. Coaches shall reserve criticism for private moments with the players or in the presence of the team if the balance of the team might benefit there from. Criticism must always be constructive.
- 7. Coaches shall refrain from running up the score. Coaches must strive to have all players on their squad participate in games. Running up the score is construed to mean 36 or more points above the opponents score. Each case will be reviewed by the Executive Board if a complaint is filed by the opposing team or a member(s) of the board.

Penalty: Imposed a fine of ten dollars (\$10) per point above 36 points above the opponents score.

- 8. A coach or manager may be asked to resign, whenever, in opinion of the CVYFL Board of Directors, the coach or manager in question is not capable of handling players or properly discharge the duties and responsibilities required of him by said Board of Directors.
- 9. Coaches may not engage in any live scrimmage or other violent contact with players.
 - Penalty: first offense, one-week suspension, second offense, one season suspension, third offense, banishment from the league.
- 10. No person can coach on more than one community team regardless of squad/division.

ADULT AFFILIATES:

- 11. Adults as referred to in these by-laws are construed to include coaches, managers, scouts, affiliate representatives, parents and guardians of players.
- 12. Adults affiliated with the CVYFL shall always strive to make every football activity of the players serve as a training ground for life.
- 13. Adults affiliated with the CVYFL shall not, while under the influence of alcoholic beverages or illegal narcotics, participate in any activity with the players.
 - Penalty: Life expulsion from the league.
- 14. Adults affiliated with the CVYFL will always set a good example in personal appearance and actions while engaged in the CVYFL program.
- 15. A parent or guardian whose conduct and/or actions are found to be detrimental to, while engaged in, the activities of the CVYFL may be requested to remove his or her player(s) and themselves from the league.
- 16. A parent, guardian or an adult friend of a player may not criticize the head coaches decision under number one of this section, except at an appropriate time and in the proper manner.
 - Penalty: the violating adult may be removed from the playing facility or practice facility for the remainder of the game or practice session.
- 17. Adults affiliated with the CVYFL will not criticize the opposing team's coaches or fans by improper comments or gestures. In addition, all organizations' fans or supporters must sit in designated affiliation section or side. They will not incite unsportsmanlike conduct, will not strike or threaten to strike a coach, manager, game official, or director of any league.
 - Penalty: first offense, removal of the guilty person(s) from the practice or game facility; second offense, banishment from all CVYFL functions for the remainder of the season; third offense, banishment from all CVYFL functions for life. Note: if the guilty person(s) refuse to leave the practice or game facility, that person(s) team or teams may be subject to forfeiture of that game in time. This decision will be made by the Executive Board.
- 18. Adults affiliated with the CVYFL will not permit the unauthorized use of funds, property and facilities in conjunction with their participation in the CVYFL program.

Penalty: first offense, one-year suspension; second offense, life expulsion from the league.

19. Adults affiliated with the CVYFL, including coaches, head and assistant, scouts, managers, found to have violated any section of this article may be suspended upon order of the Executive Board, for the balance of the current and the immediately following season. Such an order by the committee must be a result of an investigation by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE IV - PLAYERS

- 1. This article and any definitions of teams to the age and weight components thereof can only be amended at a regular meeting. Amendments to any age and weight component of any division at any regular meeting shall have priority over all other amendments to the by-laws. Amendments to the age and weight components of the by-laws must be passed by a two-thirds vote of the quorum.
- 2. Players must play for the affiliate organization's team which encompasses the school of which they attend. All others must have Board approval.

Penalty: if a player is found to be participating with a team outside his or her school boundaries, without prior Board approval, that player shall be deemed ineligible to participate for the balance of the current season. Furthermore, it is determined by an Executive Board investigation that a representative of that affiliate organization had knowledge of this ineligible participation, then that team for which the ineligible player played will be made to forfeit all games in which the said player participated. Also, if found of this wrong doing, said team will be deemed ineligible for post season play.

- 3. If a player's parents and/or school determine that the player's continued participation in the CVYFL is adversely affecting his or her schooling and so advised the team representative or head coach in writing, said player is immediately ineligible.
- 4. A head coach may request a parent or guardian to remove his or her player from the team. This action is to be taken only when such disciplinary action is absolutely essential to the welfare of the team and only in a discreet manner which will not embarrass the player and/or parent(s) or guardian(s).

PLAYER REGISTRATION

- 1. In order to be certified to a team roster, a player must be eligible under the following requirements:
 - a. A player must furnish any team representative with written consent to play football from his or her parents or legal guardian(s). If consent is revoked, the player is immediately ineligible.
 - b. A player must furnish any team representative a written statement from an examining physician as to his or her physical fitness to play football. If a physician subsequently determines that the player is no longer physically fit to play, said player is immediately ineligible.
 - c. A player must have furnished a contract form signed by his or her parent(s) or legal guardian(s) and the player, coach and affiliate organization's representative.
 - d. The preseason carnival and the first (3) games, pre-game weigh-ins, are considered the times for weight certification for all players. Each team must present player contracts for verification of identity and weight certification. Certification of weight and player identity verification must be done by a representative of the opposing affiliate organization or a member of the opposing teams coaching staff. The following must be on the players contract to be legal for player identification and weight certification.
 - 1. Current picture.
 - 2. Birth certificate.
 - 3. Physical form filled out and signed by a doctor.
 - 4. Contract signed by parent in emergency medical release area.
 - 5. Top section information completed in full.

Penalty: players whose contract(s) do not conform to the above criteria will not be weight certified and are not allowed to participate in that game.

2. Copies of a certificate or any legal document will be deemed to fulfill the teams responsibility, provided there are not strike-overs, erasures or other changes to the birth certificate, baptismal certificate, report record or school letter, which might raise a question as to the calendar year in which the player was born or the school of attendance for the player. In the event that the player does not have a copy of the valid and properly recorded birth certificate or baptismal, or if the player desires a decision on a copy of a birth certificate or baptismal certificate that has strikeovers, erasures or other suspect change, the player's calendar year of birth shall be determined by a committee appointed by the league. The decision of the committee cannot be appealed.

Penalty: The league must declare a forfeit of any game or games by any team which weighed in, suited and/or played a player(s) subsequently found to be ineligible by reason of age, school or boundary violations.

Player ages:

Peewee Division- 7,8,9. Players must turn 7 years of age by December 31, but not turn 10 years of age on or before September 1st of the current year, unless they weigh 65 lbs. or under then they can remain on Peewee.

Junior Division - 10, 11, 12. Players must turn 10 years of age by December 31, but not turn 12 years of age on or before September 1st of the current calendar year or they must move up to Sr. team unless they weigh under 100lb.

Senior Division - 12, 13, 14. Players must turn 12 years of age by December 31, but not turn 15 years of age on or before November 30th of the current calendar year.

Player Weights:

A player must make season entry weight at the pre-game weigh-in of the carnival or one of the first (3) games or the player(s) will be ineligible for the entire season. After the second game of the season, if a player who has been weight certified, exceeds his or her weight limit he/she is excluded from that game only.

Peewee Division- 50 to 117.2 lbs. (effective 2015).

Junior Division -65 to 143.2 lbs. (effective 2017)

Senior Division - 80 to 180.2 lbs. (effective 2017)

No weight changes may be changed for 5 years (2022)

Player Weighing Procedures:

- 1. All affiliates must supply digital- scale for game weigh -ins.
- 2. These weights are stripped weight. Players may weigh in with their equipment on. If a player weighs in with the equipment on and exceeds the designated weight, he or she may then strip and re-weigh once more. In other words, a maximum of two (2) weigh ins.
- 3. Pre-game weigh-ins are not to be held more than two hours prior to kick-off of the game; weigh-ins are mandatory. Pregame weigh-ins will be conducted by an official(s) of the participating affiliate organizations and/or members of the coaching staffs of the participating affiliate organizations. Each player contract must be signed and dated at each and every pre-game weigh-in to verify player eligibility or ineligibility for that game.

Penalty, first offense, 1 game suspension of each team's Head Coach, second offense, 1 year suspension of the Head Coach, third offense, expulsion from the league of the Head Coach.

4. A player must not be withheld from a pre-game weigh-in because the player was found to be overweight prior

to the time set for the pre-game weigh-in.

Penalty: the Head Coach of that player(s) team will be suspended one game for each occurrence.

5. It is prohibited to permit a player who was not weighed at the pre-game weigh-in, was found over weight at the pregame weigh-in, or was found to have used devices, medicines or methods, including but not limited to, steam rooms or cabinets and rubber sweat suits, to temporarily attain a required weight, to play in that game.

Penalty: First offense, forfeiture of the game by the violating team. If it is found that both teams agreed to let the above mentioned occur, then both teams shall forfeit that game; second offense, the team or teams and their organizations will be suspended from the league for the balance of the current season; third offense, the team or teams and their respective affiliate organizations will be expelled from the league.

6. It is not permitted to switch player(s) jerseys after the pre-game weigh-in. Players must play with the number of jersey in which they weighed.

Penalty: first offense, 1 game suspension of the Head Coach and forfeiture of that game; second offense, suspension of the Head Coach for the balance of that season and forfeiture of that game; third offense, expulsion from the league of the Head Coach and forfeiture of that game.

ARTICLE V - DIVISIONS, DEFINITIONS & SCHEDULE OF PLAY

- CVYFL Game and Practice Definitions:
- 2. A CVYFL team shall not schedule, conduct and/or play a practice, non-league, league play off championship or bowl game with a team that utilizes a different age and weight division.

Penalty: first offense, Head Coach and affiliate board shall be suspended for one year, second offense, expulsion from the league of the Head Coach and affiliate board.

- 3. For the purpose of this article the following definitions are in effect:
 - a. A bowl game is an inter-league game between teams in the current calendar year.
 - b. A championship game is an intra-league game between current calendar year division champions or play-off teams.
 - c. A play-off game is intra-league or intra-conference and is scheduled to break ties in league and/or conference standings and/or determine a league and/or conference champion. If any league or play-off game ends in a tie, the current CIF high school tie breaking system will be used to break the tie. See Article 15 of the playing rules and regulations.
 - d. A regular season game is intra-league and has bearing on the current calendar year league standings and the determination of the current season league champion.
- 4. All teams must obtain league permission for all games scheduled.

Penalty: first offense, one-year suspension of' the head coach and affiliate board, second offense, expulsion from the league of the head coach and the affiliate board.

- 5. The CVYFL will be played in Divisional Play as needed and deemed by the number of participating teams in a given year. Divisions will be agreed upon by the affiliate organizations representatives. Divisions will be revised as needed year to year.
- 6. The schedule of the CVYFL excluding championship and/or bowl and play-off games shall not exceed ten games. The schedule of all CVYFL teams must start on or after the 3rd week of August and must terminate on or before the last day of November. The league Commissioners are responsible for the scheduling of all games and scrimmages and is not permitted to delegate the responsibility and/or authority. Consultation with the league Board of Directors is required.
- 7. The schedule must be completed and distributed at the May meeting of the CVYFL.

ARTICLE VI - CARNIVALS

PW Carnival

- 1. PW Carnival will be created and published by PW Commissioner NLT than the Monday prior to Carnival
- 2. PW Carnival will be hosted by volunteer community.
- 3. All PW teams within CVYFL should participate if they can man 11 players on the field.
- 4. PW Carnival will take place on the Saturday following the 2nd week of conditioning.
- 5. Host community may charge no more and \$2 for parking, Gate \$4/\$3/\$2/\$0 and usual and customary costs for concessions.
- CVYFL will receive all monies from gate and concessions.
- 7 CVYFL will furnish all concession food and drink.
- 8. Each community will provide, as their Carnival contribution 5 cases of water (24/case), 2 cases of Gatorade (24-15 ounce) and 5 (24 cube/case) of Pepsi products (Pepsi, Mt Dew, Dr Pepper, Sierra Mist and Diet Pepsi)
- 9. Refer to supplemental PW Rules and Regulations for further instruction.

JR/SR Carnival

- 1. JR/SR Carnival will be created by each host of Sierra and Sequoia and submitted to JR/SR Commissioner and published NLT Monday prior to Carnivals.
- 2. JR/SR Carnival will rotate within each division (Sierra/Sequoia).
- 3. Each host community will keep monies earned through parking, concessions and gate fees.
- 4. Each community can/ will charge Regular Season fees: Parking \$2, Gate\$4/\$3/\$2/0 and usual and customary costs for concessions.

ARTICLE VII - PRACTICES

A practice session is defined as any skill session, group conditioning or any other form of training. Practice
sessions will not commence prior to the date set by the board for current season. A valid football practice
insurance policy must be in force prior to the first practice session of all CVYFL teams.

Penalty: first offense, one game suspension of the head coach; second offense, current season balance suspension of the head coach; third offense, expulsion from the league of the head coach.

- 2. All coaches, managers, scouts of any kind and any member of an the affiliate organization are prohibited from attending any practice session of any future opponent.
 - Penalty: first offense, one game suspension of the head coach and forfeiture of the game with that opponent, second offense, suspension of the head coach for the balance of the season and forfeiture of the game with that opponent, third offense, expulsion from the league of the head coach and guilty parties involved and forfeiture of the game with that opponent.
- 3. It is recommended that a physician or an individual holding a valid CPR-Medic First Aid card be present at all practice sessions. Also, phone access for emergency use.
- 4. No player shall participate in physical contact until the player has experienced ten hours of conditioning practice.

Penalty: player is ineligible for the season and the head coach is suspended for one season.

- At all sessions involving physical contact all players must wear full protective equipment as required in the current National Alliance Edition Football Rules book of the National Federation of the State High school Athletic Associations.
- 6. No practice session shall exceed two hours in length for the practice prior to Jr/Sr carnival and shall not exceed two and a half hours for the practice sessions after the Jr/Sr carnival. No practice session shall exceed the weekly maximum and evening termination specified below. For the duration of the full season, no practice session shall end later than 9:00p.m.

Penalty: first offense, one game suspension of the head coach, second offense, current season balance suspension of the head coach, third offense, expulsion from the league of the head coach.

- · Maximum sessions per week:
- Prior to Jr/Sr carnival: 5 per week.
- After the Jr/Sr carnival: 3 per week.

ARTICLE VIII- REGULAR SEASON GAMES

1. The home team must be responsible for the presence of a game physician or holder of a valid CPR/Medic First Aid Card or an ambulance. Also, phone access for emergency use.

Penalty: \$100.00 fine per occurrence.

- 2. The league requires that the home team employ the services of qualified officials as scheduled by the CIF.
- 3. It will be the responsibility of a home team representative to call in and report to the commissioner of the league the final scores of each game which was played on that scheduled home date and any player ejections, no later than 12 noon on Sunday following the game.

Penalty: \$25.00 fine for each occurrence and loss of voting rights until fine or fines are paid.

- 4. All games must be scheduled in keeping with all applicable local ordinances and state laws.
- 5. A period of seventy two hours must elapse between the final gun of a game and the opening kickoff of the immediately following game.
- 6. Night games may be scheduled on Saturdays only and must be started and terminated as follows:
 - Junior Division, kickoff no later than 6:00 p.m. and terminate no later than 8:00p.m.
 - Senior Division, kickoff no later than 8:00 p.m. and terminate no later than 10:00 p.m.
 - Peewee games will be played in between Junior and Senior game.
- 7. A game that is terminated for any other reason other than forfeiture may be rescheduled, if time permits, and

- shall not count against the maximum number often league games allowed.
- 8. All games forfeited due to extreme weather/air conditions will be considered a tie and will not be rescheduled.
- 9. At all games, all players shall wear fill protective equipment as required in the current National Alliance Edition Football Rules book of the State High School Athletic Associations. Exception, sneakers or non-detachable rubber cleated shoes are mandatory. Detachable cleats are not permitted and must be removed if found or player will not be permitted to further participate in that game.
- 10. Junior teams must not begin any pre-game activity prior to one hour before game time; excluding weigh-in. Senior teams may not begin any pre-game activity until half-time of the Junior game. (This does not include watching the game from the stands.) Peewees will weigh-in at start of Junior game.
- 11. Gate prices are set by CVYFL as such for 2020:

REGULAR SEASON

\$5 = ADULTS

\$4 = Ages 8 to 18

\$3 = SENIOR CITIZENS

\$0 = CHILDREN 7 & under

Communities may also charge no more than \$2 for parking for regular season games.

- 12. Referees are to be paid no later than half-time of the Peewee game. Payment shall be made by either hosting community check or from cash from the gate. Carnivals and Championship games will be paid out of the CVYFL account.
- 13. All games will be played under the current National Alliance Edition Football Rules Book of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Association subject to the following.
 - The youth size ball (5) shall be used in the Peewee Division.
 - The intermediate size ball (6 or 7) shall be used by teams in the Junior Division.
 - The intermediate size ball (7) shall be used by the teams in the Senior Division.
- 14. The home team is solely responsible for the preparation of the playing field and all required accessories for the game.
- 15. The bench area is limited to players, ten (10) adults (including a medical doctor/trainer), and two (2) water persons. Those coaches shall be coaches on roster that have signed the Coaches Code of Ethics as reported to the league.
- 16. Penalty: first offense, one game suspension for the head coach; second offense, two game suspension for the head coach; third offense, head coach suspended for the remainder of the season.
- 17. The CVYFL shall set the length of quarters for all games, but in no event shall the length of the quarters exceed ten minutes on a stop and go clock. Exception: All-Star games.
- 18. An intermission between second and third quarters (halftime) is ten minutes. For PW games, there will be four (8) minutes quarters with a five (5) minute half time.
- 19. The free substitution rule is always in effect. Extra point tries (run or pass) will be for one (1) point, kick will be for two (2) points.
- 20. The use of walkie talkies, telephone or other communication devices and/or equipment and/or spotters with or without runners are prohibited in all games.

Penalty: first offense, one game suspension of the head coach, second offense, balance of the current season suspension for the head coach, third offense, expulsion from the league for the head

coach.

21. The use of game films, interchanged and/or taken by coaches, managers, scouts, parents or others for the purpose of scouting future opponents is prohibited. A scout must view the game from the stands and must be identifiable.

Penalty: first offense, one game suspension of the bead coach and forfeiture of the game for which the film was used, second offense, one season suspension for the head coach and forfeiture of the game for which the film was used, third offense, expulsion from the league for the head coach and forfeiture of the game for which the film was used.

22. The weight of a player may be challenged prior to the game only at weigh-ins and only in the presence of the head coaches of the two teams.

Penalty: first offense, one game suspension of the head coach, second offense, balance of the current season suspension for the head coach, third offense, expulsion from the league for the head coach.

Penalty:

- 23. All coaches must abide by a doctor's decision in all matters pertaining to a player's health, injuries and/or physical ability to participate in a game of the CVYFL.
- 24. Spearing will not be tolerated in the CVYFL. It is generally committed by a defensive player, but can be committed by an offensive player also. It subjects a guilty player, as determined by game officials, to be charged with a personal foul for unnecessary roughness. Repeated offenses will result in the removal of the offending player from the game at the discretion of the game officials. Spearing, if taught by a CVYFL coach, shall subject individuals to summary of dismissal upon a finding of guilt after a hearing.
- 25. During the game, the warm-up period preceding the game, the halftime intermission, until the team has left the locker room and departed for home, the head coach is fully and directly responsible for actions involving himself, his assistants, the members of the managerial staff assigned to the bench area for all of the decisions of all game officials as being fair and called to the best ability of the game officials. The coach must remain in control of himself at all times in order to set a good example for players and spectators.
- 26. Any game ending in a tie after regulation time shall enact the CIF high school tie breaking system in effect as of the date of that game. This system will be in effect at all CVYFL games.
- 27. A team must have sixteen (16) players on the roster with eleven (11) eligible and must be able to play eleven in a game. Otherwise the team must forfeit the game. A team shall have not less than and not more than the following number of players certified to its roster:
 - Peewee Division- 30 maximum, 16 minimum If under 16 can't make playoffs
 - Junior Division- 35 maximum, 16 minimum
 If under 16 can't make playoffs
 - Senior Division -35 maximum, 16 minimum
 If under 16 can't make playoffs
- 28. The use of ice chests are only permitted by the coaching staff players and cheerleaders for sideline use only. Outside beverages or food is not permitted by the spectators/parents in the stadiums. If there is a special dietary need for a coach/player/patron of a visiting community, it must be brought to the attention of the

[&]quot;Sweating Down" tactics used so that a player may temporarily attain a required weight is expressly prohibited. "Sweating Down" shall include but not be limited to, uses of steam rooms, cabinets and/or rubber sweat suits.

CVYFL rep of the hosting community for exception consideration of this rule.

Penalty: \$100.00 fine to affiliated organization.

29. All scores from games will be submitted via text or call to PW Commissioner and JR/SR Commissioners no later than noon on Sunday for proper recording of standings. Standing will be emailed out to all CVFYL Board/Reps no later than Monday at noon following Saturday games.

ARTICLE IX - PLAYOFFS, CHAMPIONSHIPS & ALLSTARS

- The top 4 teams in each Sierra and Sequoia divisions will participate in playoffs and is determined by division standings. In the event of a tie of more than one team in the same division, the seating is based on overall league standings. (Amendment 2016)
- 2. Home field advantage is based on standings for playoffs. In the event of a tied standing with both teams, the home field advantage goes to the winning score of those two teams and in accordance to utility requirements of water, sewer and lights. (Amendment 2016)
- For Playoffs and Championship Rounds, if a team with home field advantage does not have water, toilets or lights, the game(s) will take place at the opposing team's field. If both teams cannot meet the requirement, then the higher seated team may select a location within their own division (Sequoia/Sierra) as long as it is within the coverage of CVYFL insurance. (Amendment 2016)
- 4. It is the purpose of the formation of league all-star teams to first recognize outstanding players and secondly to earn financial support for our league. It is imperative that all teams support the all-star concepts if it is to be successful. The league must remain stronger and more important than any individual team. Therefore it is the league directive that all teams must participate in the process by which all-star teams are chosen. All teams must send to the all-star game the selected number of players as determined by their league standings. The head coach from each team will be responsible for choosing all-stars from his team.
- 5. If any affiliate organization for any reason does not send players to any all-star game and practices, said affiliate will pay a fine of \$250.00 per team. Said affiliate will also be barred from any participation from proceeds of an all-star game. Said affiliate will be suspended from league participation until the fine is paid. Offending team coaches will be suspended until the fine is paid. Offending team representatives will be suspended until the fine is paid. Amendment 2014: If a town fails to send representation to All Star practices, each non represented spot will be filled going in order of precedence from lowest to highest ranking until all spots are filled.
- 6. For championships and allstars games, concession and parking receipts go to hosting town and all gate fees go to CVYFL. Monies raised from the all-star games are for the sole benefit of the league, players and/or teams with unusual circumstances. It is important the league be independently financially solvent so as to be available to solve any potential emergency and to protect the integrity of the league in any legal matter which might arise.
- 7. The maximum number of players allowed on the field from one team may not exceed 6 players. There are no restrictions for blitzing or defensive formations. It is the head coach's responsibility to make sure all CVYFL rules are followed.
- 8. Beginning with the 1999 season, playoff receipts will be kept by the host community. All-stars receipts will be divided between the League and host community. Monies accumulated in the League account will be dispersed at the discretion of the League, and not returned to communities in the form of credits toward League fees.
- 9. CVYFL players are allowed to be named to league sanctioned All-Star youth football teams and to take part in league sanctioned All-Star youth football games.

\$5 = ADULTS

\$4 = Ages 8 to 18

\$3 = SENIOR CITIZENS

\$0 = CHILDREN 7 & under

- 10. Communities may also charge no more than \$2 for parking for PW Carnival and post regular season games, to include playoffs, championship and all stars.
- 11. If any given team does not win a single game during the entire regular season, that team does not participate in playoffs.
- 12. Whichever community wins the SR Championship, will host the CVYFL All- Star Game

ARTICLE X-AWARDS AND RECOGNITIONS

- 1. No teams, association, booster club, or any other individual or group of individuals directly or indirectly affiliated with the CVYFL shall grant, bestow or otherwise present or convey to any player an expensive trophy or other award. Any trophy or other award given to an individual may not cost more than fifty dollars. Recognition for scholastic achievements, CVYFL approved scholarship and special awards are exempt from the fifty dollar limitation.
- 2. For the purpose of this article, parents or groups of parents of players and/or sponsoring organizations or booster clubs of teams are considered to be CVYFL affiliated.
- 3. CVYFL teams are allowed to consider and award to individual players, trophies for MVP, Most Improved, Most Inspirational, as voted by the players of the team, and/or Special Recognition or Coaches Award, in addition to special recognition for each team member participation, league championship, bowl participation, all-star selection, participation and in addition to scholarships and recognition for scholastic achievement. Discretion is encouraged and excess discouraged.
- 4. A team that is on probation or suspension by action of the CVYFL cannot be awarded the designation of league champions or receive trophies in recognition of such designation.

ARTICLE XI- DISCIPLINARY ACTION AND INVESTIGATIONS

- 1. The CVYFL may discipline its teams, including adult personnel as follows:
- 2. Hearing held pursuant to disciplinary actions instituted by the CVYFL are to be fairly and impartially conducted with opposing sides or the accused permitted to present both oral and written material through its Board Representative. In any such hearing, the applicable by-laws, rules and regulations are to be made available. The Board will be required to take accurate written minute of the hearing.
- 3. The subject of the disciplinary action must be advised orally, via the telephone, in, person through either their Board of Director Representative or an Executive Board member or in writing at least three days prior to the hearings, as to the time and place of the hearings, the purpose of the hearings and all of the charges and issues involved in the hearing. The Executive Board however has the authority to call an emergency meeting to settle the matter if time is a factor in the well being of those parties involved and the welfare of the CVYFL.
- 4. All parties of the hearing have the right to present witnesses and testify in their own behalf
- 5. All parties of the hearing are entitled to confront and be confronted by parties and witnesses of the other side and to cross examine them.
- 6. The Executive Board must issue a report, orally or written to the accused the night of the hearing or within one week of the conclusion of the hearing. The report must note the finding of the facts, the decision citing applicable authority and the penalty imposed.
- 7. The findings of the Executive Board are final where penalties are printed in the by-laws, rules and regulations. In other cases where there are no printed penalties, a decision of the Executive Board may be reversed at a regularly scheduled Board meeting by a two-thirds vote of the quorum in attendance.
- 8. The Executive Board may investigate possible violations of the CVYFL by-laws, rules and regulations and/or conduct that is improper or detrimental to the welfare of the CVYFL.
- 9. The President will preside at the hearing. The President has the right to question anyone at anytime and to rule at any time during the hearing on the relevance of any and all testimony and evidence. The Secretary will arrange for the taking of the minutes of the hearing.
- 10. The Executive Board will not be compensated for investigative hearings.
- 11. If the hearings conducted by the Executive Board under the provisions of this Article, involve serious age

and/or weight infractions or other matters that concern the safety and well being of the players, the Executive Board has the authority to order the suspension of any adults, teams or sponsors involved. The suspension shall remain in effect until a judgment of the Executive Board or the Board of Directors has been made.

ARTICLE XII— AMENDMENTS

- 1. Proposed amendments to these by-laws must be presented in writing to the President only by an affiliate organizations representative at a regular meeting.
- 2. A team representative cannot decline to present an amendment to these by-laws as provided in paragraph I hereof if same has been recommended to he or her by his or her Board of Directors.
- 3. Amendments to these by-laws proposed by the President must be forwarded to the team representatives at least prior to a regular meeting and must not require prior approval of endorsement by a team representative.
- 4. Proposed amendments properly presented must be voted upon at the following regular meeting. A two-thirds affirmation vote of the quorum is required to amend these by-laws.
- 5. Proposed amendments that are presented to the President by an affiliate organization representative in writing must be done so by the February meeting in order to be voted on in the March meeting, as prescribed above, to be added to the by-laws for the next regular season. Any amendments proposed after the February meeting will be held and not voted upon until the next regular meeting after the end of the CVYFL football season.
- 6. Bylaw change submittals will primarily submitted during the January CVYFL meeting, but additional bylaw changes may occur throughout the season but must be approved unanimously by all those present at the meeting the bylaw change was introduced.

SUBJECT

APPROVE Resolution No. 2577 Concerning Certifications and Claims for Collection of Measure "C" Funds for Fiscal Year 2022-2023 and Authorize the Finance Director to Sign the Local Transportation Pass Through Revenue Certifications and Claim Forms.

RECOMMENDATION

The City Manager and Finance Director recommend City Council approve Resolution No. 2577 to submit the Local Transportation Purposes Certifications and Claim Forms to Fresno County Transportation Authority (FCTA) for the City of Fowler to collect its share of Measure "C" funds for fiscal year 2022-2023, and authorize the Finance Director to sign the Local Transportation Pass Through Revenue Certifications and Claim Forms.

BACKGROUND

On June 8, 2022, the FCTA Board adopted their Board Resolution No. 2022-06 (Resolution attached) for Measure C Extension Local Transportation Purposes Pass-Through Projects and Program Funds apportionment for fiscal year 2022-2023. The following is the Local Transportation Program Pass-Through and Subprograms of which the City of Fowler will receive Measure C funding:

- 0.90% of \$16,882,883 for Street Maintenance Category sub program; City's share is \$152,307;
- 0.90% of \$590,901 for ADA Compliance Category sub program; City's share is \$5,331;
- 1.04% of \$16,972,627 for Flexible Funding Category sub program; City's share is \$177,273.

Each subprogram has various requirements and exemptions for spending the funds as outlined in the Measure C Extension 2007 Local Agency Handbook. These are the estimated apportionments scheduled for FY 2022-2023 for the City of Fowler Measure C Extension Program.

To receive these funds monthly, the City must file a separate 2022-2023 Certification and Claim form for each sub program (forms attached) along with a City Council Resolution which is to be submitted to the Fresno County Transportation Authority by September 15, 2022. Once these documents have been accepted, each agency will receive a separate check for each sub program. Measure "C" funds will be distributed on a proportional basis as funds are received.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

This action does not constitute a "project" pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act.

FISCAL IMPACT

The 2022-2023 Measure C funding will augment other local transportation fund sources to carry out street maintenance programs and other public transportation improvements during the fiscal year.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FOWLER CONCERNING LOCAL TRANSPORTATION PURPOSE FUNDS EXTENSION (MEASURE "C" EXTENSION)

WHEREAS, the *City of Fowler* is an eligible claimant of funds for Measure C Extension Local Transportation Pass-Through Projects and Program Funds pursuant to California Public Utilities Code Section 142257; and

WHEREAS, the Fresno County Transportation Authority has adopted a Resolution of Apportionment for FY 2022-2023, Measure C Extension Local Transportation Pass-Through Projects and Program Funds setting the *City of Fowler's* percentages at the following:

- 0.90% of \$16,882,883 (or \$152,307) for the Local Transportation Program, Local Allocation Street Maintenance Category sub program;
- 0.90% of \$590,901 (or \$5,331) for the Local Transportation Program, Local Allocation ADA Compliance Category sub program;
- 1.04% of \$16,972,627 (or \$177,273) for the Local Transportation Program, Local Allocation Flexible Funding Category sub program;

which shall be the proportionate share of Measure C Extension Local Transportation Pass-Through Projects and Program Funds to the City shall be entitled within the fiscal year; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS:

- The *City of Fowler* hereby submits its Local Transportation Purposes Certification and Claims for Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Measure C Extension Local Transportation Pass-Through Projects and Program Funds;
- 2) The *City of Fowler* hereby requests the release of funds to the City on a monthly payment basis consistent with the adopted percentages listed above, based on actual receipts;
- 3) The City Council of the *City of Fowler* further certifies:
 - a) That Local Transportation Purpose Funds will not be used to substitute for property tax funds which the *City of Fowler* had previously used for local transportation purposes; and
 - b) That the *City of Fowler* has and will segregate property tax revenues used to support local transportation purposes so that verification of non-substitution can be proved through audit and:
 - c) That the *City of Fowler* shall separately account for Local Transportation Purposes Funds received, pursuant to Public Utilities Code Section 142257. The City shall maintain records in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, and shall separately record expenditures for each type of eligible purpose. The City shall make such records available to the Authority for inspection or audit at any time.

- The *City of Fowler* understands that should a financial or compliance audit reveal that the *City of Fowler* violated any of the requirements set forth in paragraph 3 (a) (b) or (c), that the Fresno County Transportation Authority may seek to take immediate steps to resolve the violation in accordance with its adopted procedures.
- 5) The *City of Fowler* will submit completed Local Transportation Pass Through Revenues Reporting Requirements for prior year expenditures before November 15.

None. The monument signs will be paid for as part of the project.



SUBJECT

Discuss various proposals for fire protection services for the City of Fowler and provide staff direction

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommend City Council provide direction on this item.

BACKGROUND

After two closed session discussions with Council on March 29 and April 19, 2022, staff, as directed, presented a three-year agreement for fire protection services with Fresno County Fire Protection District in the amount of \$675,000 with annual escalations, during the June 7, 2022 Council meeting. After a lengthy public discussion, Council directed staff to analyze the accuracy and feasibility of two different proposals presented by Councilmember Kazarian and Chief Lopez to transition Fowler Fire Department from all volunteer staff to either part-time or full-time firefighters. These proposals were presented during the public discussion and are included as Attachments.

In addition, during the June 21, 2022 Council meeting, Councilmember Mejia asked Council to support his request to have one additional proposal analyzed. Council agreed and directed Staff to analyze this proposal as well; it is also included as an Attachment.

Staff worked closely with Chief Micheal Despain of M.E.D Enterprises, Inc., to analyze the accuracy and feasibility of each proposal. Comments regarding each proposal are outlined below:

1. Councilmember Kazarian's Proposal (Attachment A)

This proposal assumes conversion of the existing volunteer firefighters to full-time firefighters over a three-year period.

Key observations and comments:

- The full-time salaries for the Fire Chief and Captain(s) are assumed flat year-over-year. However, these positions would be eligible for step increases and Council-approved cost of living increases to the pay range on an annual basis. The same assumptions were made for all of staffing within this proposal, thus underestimating all ongoing salary expenses.
- Estimated costs for administrative support staff are low and do not consider the staff time needed to manage a large workforce with a complex payroll.
- This proposal does not account for staffing and overtime costs due to absences associated with medical leaves, vacations, and training.
- This proposal does not include any ongoing costs for technology equipment, annual software licenses, policy management and training software, and related costs.
- Councilmember Kazarian's proposal considers phasing out volunteer firefighters over the next two (2) years, and having the department fully transition to a career fire department by year three (3).
- Certain considerations need to be maintained regarding volunteer firefighters, to ensure that their status does not change to that of a regular employee.
 - The minimum wage and overtime provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) are not applicable to individuals who provide volunteer services to state and local governments. (29 CFR § 553.101.)
 - Volunteers may receive paid expenses, reasonable benefits, a nominal fee, or any combination thereof, for their services without losing their volunteer status. (29 CFR § 553.106.)
 - This includes reimbursement for tuition, transportation and meal costs, uniform stipend, or for being provided with books, supplies, or other materials essential to their training (or reimbursement for the cost thereof).
 - Nominal fee: This includes a "per call" basis or a monthly/yearly stipend; and the line between a volunteer and an employee is a person can still be considered a volunteer so long as the nominal fee being paid is no more than 20% of what the employer would pay a regular employee.
 - A nominal fee is not a substitute for compensation and cannot be tied to productivity. There are several factors in determining whether a fee is to be considered "nominal" including: distance traveled, time and effort expended, whether the volunteer agreed to be available at all times or specific time periods, and whether services provided were, "as needed" or throughout the year.
 - Providing excessive pay or control over the schedules of a volunteer firefighter could result in a determination that a volunteer is actually an employee, and those hours worked would be compensable accordingly.
- This proposal retains all the risk and liability with the City, with some mitigation over time assuming the agency can overcome the recruitment and retention barriers.
- It is estimated that in year one alone, there is a shortfall of approximately \$172,000 with the shortfall growing in subsequent years.

2. Chief Lopez's Proposal (Attachment B)

This proposal assumes conversion of the volunteer firefighters to part-time firefighters as part of "a sleeper program."

Key observations and comments:

- As part of Chief Lopez's proposal, it is estimated only nine (9) of the City's existing volunteers are interested in part-time firefighter opportunities. An ongoing recruitment process would need to be prioritized and a background and medical screening processes implemented.
- The proposal lacks any data regarding start-up and ongoing costs to operate the fire department.
- The proposal does not adequately address the vacancy rate of this staffing model. In short, the agency would conservatively need approximately 18 volunteers to provide adequate coverage without violating work hour rules. Vacancies include but not limited to, sick leave, family sick leave, injury leave, outside training, holiday, vacation, full-time job needs, etc.
- The proposal does not address how to provide the 20 hours (average) of training per month without violating work/hour rules.
- The City needs to balance the line between part-time and full-time employees as both statuses have significant benefits implications. Generally, employers have discretion to determine when an employee is considered full-time or part-time, but certain numbers of hours worked trigger benefits under State and Federal law.
 - Affordable Care Act 29 USC § 4980H, subd. (c)(4)
 - A full-time employee under the Act is considered an employee that works an average of at least 30 hours per week and therefore would be entitled to healthcare benefits.
 - CalPERS Labor Code § 20305, subd. (a)(2) and (a)(3)(B)
 - A part-time employee becomes eligible for CalPERS benefits if their position requires the employee to serve for one year or longer, for an average of 20 hours per week.
 - Or, the employee works more than 1,000 hours in a fiscal year.
 - Overtime pay –FLSA 29 USC § 207, subd. (k)
 - The FLSA provides a limited exception to overtime pay for fire protection and law enforcement employees.
 - Overtime pay need not be paid until the number of hours that the employees work in a work period exceeds the ratio of 212 hours in a 28 consecutive day work period. (29 CFR § 553.201, subd. (a).)
 - For the City to utilize the Section 7(k) exception, it must establish a fixed regularly recurring period of work from 7 to 28 days, and in practice not exceed (the ratio of) 212 hours within a 28 day period.
- This proposal retains all the risk and liability with the City, with some mitigation over time assuming the agency can overcome the recruitment, training, and retention barriers.

3. Councilmember Mejia's Proposal (Attachment C)

This proposal focuses on salaries associated with six (6) to eight (8) paid part-time employees fully staffing the station for 24-hour coverage.

Key observations and comments:

- The proposal does not adequately address the vacancy rate of this staffing model. In short, the agency would conservatively need approximately 17 "part-time" positions to provide adequate coverage without violating work hour rules. Vacancies include but not limited to, sick leave, family sick leave, injury leave, outside training, holiday, vacation, full-time job needs, etc.
- The 17 part-time positions would also need to be replenished each year (i.e. a whole new group of 17) if the City wishes to avoid the CalPERS 1,000 rule.
- The proposal does not address how to provide the 20 hours (average) of training per month without violating work/hour rules.
- As mentioned above, an employee working in excess of 30 hours per week would be classified as a "full-time" employee under the Affordable Care Act, and therefore eligible for healthcare benefits.
- Likewise, if the employee is working on average at least 20 hours per week, they would be entitled to benefits under CalPERS.
- Per Councilmember Mejia's proposal, the City would utilize two (2) part-time employees per 12-hour shift, this would result in 10 shifts or 120 hours in a 28-day period. The Section 7(k) overtime exception would apply.
- The proposal lacks a lot of ongoing costs necessary to stand up the department such as training, equipment needs, administrative support staff, etc.
- This proposal retains all the risk and liability with the City, with some mitigation over time assuming the agency can overcome the recruitment, training, and retention barriers.
- It is estimated that in year one alone, there is a shortfall of approximately \$665,635.

To illustrate true costs and steps associated with converting the existing Fowler volunteer fire department to a professionally trained full-time staffed department, Chief Despain developed a plan outlining all one-time project startup and ongoing costs, such as salary and operational expenses. This plan is implemented over a 5-year period and is included as Attachment D for comparison purposes. This plan also includes an estimated risk factor with each year of implementation.

It is important to note that each of the above referenced proposals do not include the capital expenses associated with the buildout of Phase II of the Fire Station. It is assumed that the Phase II construction of the sleeping quarters, shower facilities, and apparatus bay exhaust system will be initiated as soon as possible as these improvements are required to properly house permanent fire staff in the station.

The key issues for consideration are:

- 1). Which proposal provides the best outcome measurements for the community in terms of fire protection, emergency medical, rescue, hazardous material (environmental protection) service?
- 2). Which proposal has the best return of investment?
- 3). Which proposal provides the best risk/liability reduction to the City?
- 4). Which proposal provides the most downward pressure on insurance rates for the community rate payers?

- 5). Which model is the least impactful on existing city staff, existing unallocated revenues, and other city resources?
- 6). Which proposal meets the community's residual expectations?

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

This action does not constitute a "project" pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act.

FISCAL IMPACT

As this is a workshop, and no action is being taken by Council, there is no fiscal impact at this time.

RECOMMENDATION

The City Council directed the City Attorney and staff to prepare a proposed resolution for the City Council to consider placing a special transactions and use (sales) tax measure on the November 8, 2022 ballot for the voters to decide. If Resolution No. 2578 is approved by a majority of the City Council, the special transactions and use tax measure will appear on the ballot for the November 8, 2022 election in the City of Fowler.

BACKGROUND

At the June 21, 2022, City Council meeting the City Council directed the City Attorney and staff to prepare a proposed resolution for the Council to consider placing a special transactions and use tax increase measure of 0.275% for the Fowler Fire Department on the November 8, 2022 ballot for the voters to decide whether to approve the tax increase.

If the resolution calling the election for the special tax measure and approving the ballot question, the City Council will present the measure proposing a 0.275% increase to the existing Transactions and Use tax rate in the City of Fowler - a proposed increase to the maximum rate of 9.25% allowed State law. The proposed tax increase is for a special tax, which will require a 'yes' vote by 2/3 of votes cast by the voters of Fowler to be approved.

However, because this is a proposed special tax measure, Section 2(b) of Article XIII C of the California Constitution, added by Proposition 218, effective November 1996, does not require it be submitted to voters at a general election. If desired, a special tax measure could be submitted to voters at a special election. The next such special election date is in March 2023.

Moreover, a citizen initiative petition for a special tax measure for fire department funding is already underway. If the proponents of the citizen initiative gather enough signatures, the measure will appear on the November 8, 2022 ballot (if signatures are gathered and verified in time), or a special election may be called for March 2023 if the required signature gathering and verification does not meet the deadline for including the measure on the November 8, 2022 ballot. If the measure is placed on the ballot through the citizen initiative process, based on a recent court of appeal ruling on a special tax in Fresno, the special tax measure will be approved by a simple majority of 'yes' votes (50% + 1) cast at the election.

The proposed ballot question for the special transactions and use tax is included in Resolution No. 2578. The question complies with applicable provisions of the Elections Code (Sections 9, 9051, and 13247) which limit the text of a ballot question to no more than 75 words, including the title. The proposed question to be placed on the ballot for Council consideration is as follows:

CITY OF FOWLER FIRE DEPARTMENT TAX MEASURE: Shall an ordinance
increasing the transactions and use tax rate in the City of Fowler by 0.275% be
approved to generate approximately \$250,000 annually to be used only for fire
department expenses such as fire station upgrades, equipment, and firefighter staffing
costs, until ended by voters, subject to annual audits available to the public, with all
funds being used only to fund fire protection services in the City of Fowler and
benefitting Fowler residents?

The above proposed text may be modified by the City Council before approving Resolution No. 2578 but the text must not exceed 75 words. If the Resolution is approved, staff will return at a future City Council meeting to introduce an ordinance adding a new section to Chapter 5 of Title 3 of the Fowler Municipal Code relating to the proposed special Transactions and Use tax increase. The ordinance will be conditioned upon approval of the tax increase measure by the voters at the election.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

This action does not constitute a "project" pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act.

FISCAL IMPACT

The City incurs a cost every other year to conduct an election. The estimated cost to conduct the regularly scheduled election will be budgeted and accounted for in the 2022-23 budget. If a measure is placed on the ballot, additional costs will be incurred, but the increased amount is unknown at this time. Staff will return to the City Council with a budget amendment request if necessary.

If a special tax measure is placed on the ballot, and if it is approved by the voters, it is expected to raise approximately \$250,000 annually in additional revenue. Such additional revenue will be restricted to fire department and fire protection services in Fowler.

RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FOWLER CALLING FOR AND GIVING NOTICE OF THE HOLDING OF A SPECIAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION TO BE CONSOLIDATED WITH THE REGULARLY SCHEDULED GENERAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 2022, TO PRESENT TO VOTERS A MEASURE TO ADOPT AN ORDINANCE ENACTING A 0.275% SPECIAL TRANSACTIONS AND USE TAX INCREASE; REQUESTING CONSOLIDATION THEREOF WITH THE STATEWIDE GENERAL ELECTION TO BE HELD ON THE SAME DATE; REQUESTING THAT THE FRESNO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AUTHORIZE THE FRESNO COUNTY CLERK TO RENDER SPECIFIED SERVICES TO THE CITY OF FOWLER RELATING TO THE CONDUCT OF THE SPECIAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION; AND APPROVING THE PROPOSED BALLOT MEASURE DESCRIPTION

WHEREAS, applicable provisions of the Revenue and Taxation Code authorize the City to levy or increase a transactions and use tax for special purposes by ordinance after approval by supermajority 2/3 vote of the qualified electors of the City voting in an election on the issue; and

WHEREAS, the City Council met at its regularly scheduled meeting of June 21, 2022, to discuss and consider a potential special tax to fund the Fowler Fire Department and fire protection services in the City, and directed City staff to prepare materials for the Council to consider placement of a proposed ballot measure for a proposed 0.275% special tax increase to the City's current Transactions and Use Tax rate of 8.975%; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with applicable provisions of the California Constitution and California Elections Code the City Council desires to submit to the voters of the City of Fowler a ballot measure proposal for a special tax increase to the existing rate of the transaction and use tax in the City of Fowler by 0.275%, for a total rate of 9.25% (hereinafter the "Measure"); and

WHEREAS, if the Measure is approved by the voters, the 0.275% increase to the transactions and use tax will be a special tax, the revenue of which will be placed in a separate fund to pay for Fowler Fire Department and fire protection expenses; and

WHEREAS, Section 10401 of the Elections Code authorizes the Fresno County Board of Supervisors to consolidate the special municipal election for the Measure with the statewide general election scheduled for November 8, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the special tax increase Measure cannot be imposed without a super-majority 2/3 voter approval; and

WHEREAS, voter approval of the Measure increasing the City's transaction and use tax rate will require an ordinance amending the Fowler Municipal Code defining the rate and more completely describing the Measure and details of the special tax, which ordinance shall be prepared by the City Attorney so as to be enacted if the Measure is approved by the voters (hereinafter "Ordinance").

NOW, THEREORE, the City Council of the City of Fowler hereby resolves as follows:

- **SECTION 1.** Pursuant to Article XIII C, Section 2(d) of the California Constitution, Section 53724 of the Government Code, and applicable provisions of the Elections Code, the City Council of the City of Fowler hereby calls and orders an election at which the Measure relating to the increase of the City's transactions and use tax shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the City.
- **SECTION 2.** The City Council requests the Fresno County Board of Supervisors to consolidate the special municipal election for this Measure with the statewide general election on November 8, 2022, pursuant to section 10403 of the Elections Code, and acknowledges that the consolidated election will be held and conducted in the manner prescribed in Elections Code section 10418.
- **SECTION 3.** The City requests that the Fresno County Clerk/Registrar of Voters conduct the election and canvass the returns, and the City agrees to pay the proportionate share of reasonable expenses of said election, said share to consist of all direct costs as determined by the Fresno County Clerk to be directly related to the conduct of the City's special municipal election.
- **SECTION 4.** At the general municipal election to be held on November 8, 2022, the following question shall be submitted to registered voters of the City of Fowler and shall be printed on the election ballot in the form set forth as follows:

CITY OF FOWLER FIRE DEPARTMENT TAX MEASURE: Shall an ordinance increasing the transactions and use tax rate in the City of Fowler by 0.275% be approved to generate approximately \$250,000 annually to be used only for fire department expenses such as fire station upgrades, equipment, and firefighter staffing costs, until ended by voters, subject to annual audits available to the public, with all funds being used only to fund fire protection services in the City of Fowler and benefitting Fowler residents?

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- **SECTION 5.** The Measure shall be designated on the ballot by a letter, as provided in Elections Code Section 13116. This measure shall be designated by letter by the Fresno County Clerk.
- **SECTION 6.** Passage of the Measure requires a 2/3 super-majority of votes from qualified voters of the City voting in the election.
- **SECTION 7.** In all particulars not recited in this resolution, the election shall be held and conducted as provided by law for holding municipal elections.
- **SECTION 8.** Pursuant to Elections Code section 12111, the City Council hereby directs the City Clerk, with the assistance of the City Attorney, to prepare a synopsis of the Measure and transmit the synopsis to the Fresno County Clerk/Registrar of Voters to be published in accordance with section 12111.
- **SECTION 9.** The full text of the Measure submitted to the voters and the Ordinance to be enacted to implement the Measure, if the Measure is approved by the voters, will not be printed in the sample ballot and voter's pamphlet. However, the full text of the Measure and the full text of

the Ordinance shall be made available at the Office of the Fresno County Clerk/Registrar of Voters and the Office of the Fowler City Clerk.

SECTION 10. Arguments in favor of or against the proposed measure are permissible and shall be filed with the Fresno County Clerk/Registrar of Voters in accordance with applicable provisions of the Elections Code, including sections 9280 through 9287 thereof.

SECTION 11. Pursuant to Elections Code section 9280, the City Council hereby directs the City Clerk to transmit a copy of the Measure to the City Attorney, and the City Attorney shall prepare an impartial analysis of the Measure in accordance with Elections Code section 9280 and file it with the Fresno County Clerk/Registrar of Voters.

SECTION 12. The City Clerk shall file a certified copy of this resolution with the Fresno County Clerk/Registrar of Voters as required by applicable law. The City Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to work with the Fresno County Clerk/Registrar of Voters and take all steps necessary to cause placement of the Measure and any associated arguments, analysis, synopsis, summary, or ballot question on the ballot.

SECTION 13. The City Clerk and City Attorney are authorized to make any typographical, clerical, non-substantive corrections to this resolution and the Measure to be placed on the ballot as may be deemed necessary by the Fresno County Clerk/Registrar of Voters.

SECTION 14. California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The adoption of this Resolution is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act, Public Resources Code§§ 21000 et seq. ("CEQA") and 14 Cal. Code Reg. §§ 15000 et seq. ("CEQA Guidelines"). The calling and noticing of a Special Municipal Election for the submission of a ballot measure to voters is not a project within the meaning of CEQA Guidelines Section 15378.

SECTION 15. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Resolution or its application to any person or circumstance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Resolution or its application to other persons and circumstances. The City Council of the City of Fowler hereby declares that it would have adopted this Resolution and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions be declared invalid or unconstitutional and, to that end, the provisions hereof are hereby declared to be severable

severable.
