About HOME ARP

- The County of Fresno received a \$4.2 million **American Rescue Plan (ARP)** allocation to fund programs or projects that assist qualifying populations. This allocation is administered through the County's HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME).
- "Qualifying populations" are individuals or households who are homeless, at risk of homelessness, and other vulnerable populations.

Eligible Activities

Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA)

Rental assistance for eligible households. Assistance up to four years.

Supportive Services

• Services to assist eligible households transition to and maintain more appropriate housing. Examples include case management, mental health counseling or substance abuse counseling.

Acquisition/Development of Non-Congregate Shelter (NCS) or Rental Units

• This activity includes the acquisition / development of a NCS or rental housing to support an eligible population.

Qualifying Populations

- Homeless or At Risk of Homelessness
- Fleeing, or Attempting to Flee, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, Stalking, or Human Trafficking

Other populations per HUD guidance

- Other families requiring services or housing assistance to prevent homelessness
- Households at greatest risk of housing instability
- Veterans and families that include a veteran family member that meet the criteria of the qualifying populations

 - Completed in 2019

APPROVE Resolution No. 2600, A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Fowler Authorizing Remote Teleconferencing for City Council Meetings and Commission Meetings During Declared State of Emergency in Accordance with Government Code Section 54953 (AB 361)

RECOMMENDATION

The City Council approved Resolution No. 2592 on September 20, 2022, to allow City Council members to attend City Council meetings via remote teleconferencing pursuant to AB 361. The Resolution also authorized the City's other commissions to meet remotely for as long as the City Council authorizes. Resolution No. 2600 must be approved if the City Council desires to continue with remote teleconferencing for City Council and various City commission meetings as authorized by Government Code Section 54953 as amended by AB 361.

BACKGROUND

AB 361 amended the Ralph M. Brown Act last year to allow legislative bodies the option of continuing to conduct meetings via remote teleconference or virtually without complying with the typical Brown Act requirements necessary for legislative body members to attend meetings remotely. One of the requirements for being allowed to use the remote teleconferencing authorized under AB 361 is that the legislative body must make certain findings every 30 days to continue conducting meetings at which legislative body members may attend remotely without complying with the typical pre-AB 361 Brown Act requirements for remote attendance at city council meetings.

This resolution with the required findings must be approved to continue with remote teleconferencing for City Council and various City commission meetings as authorized by Government Code Section 54953 as amended by AB 361. If approved, a continuing resolution will be brought forward at future

City Council meetings (at least every 30 days) for the Council to consider the required findings to continue authorized remote teleconferencing.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

This action does not constitute a "project" pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act.

FISCAL IMPACT

No fiscal impact is anticipated whether this Resolution is approved or not.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FOWLER AUTHORIZING CONTINUED USE OF REMOTE TELECONFERENCING FOR CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS AND COMMISSION MEETINGS DURING DECLARED STATE OF EMERGENCY IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 54953 AS AMENDED BY AB 361

- **WHEREAS**, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of California declared a state of emergency in the State as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic; and
- **WHEREAS**, pursuant to Resolution 2461, approved by the Fowler City Council on March 17, 2020, the City Council declared a local emergency as a result of the threatened spread of COVID-19 in the City, surrounding areas, and the state; and
- WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, with the issuance of Executive Order N-29-20, the Governor suspended certain provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act in order to allow local legislative bodies to conduct meetings telephonically or by other remote means; and
- **WHEREAS**, on June 11, 2021, the Governor issued Executive Order N-08-21, which placed an end date of September 30, 2021, for agencies to meet remotely; and
- WHEREAS, AB 361 was enacted on September 16, 2021, enacting certain changes to the Brown Act for teleconferencing and remote participation at public meetings as set forth in Government Code Section 54953; and
- WHEREAS, the City Council approved Resolution No. 2522 on October 19, 2021, authorizing teleconferencing and remote attendance at City Council meetings and other City commission meetings in accordance with Government Code Section 54953 as amended by AB 361, and subsequently approved a series of resolutions in accordance with Government Code Section 54953(e)(3) to continue with remote attendance at meetings; and
- **WHEREAS**, thirty days elapsed between the August 16, 2022, and September 20, 2022, City Council meetings, and the original authorization for remote meetings expired; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City Council approved Resolution No. 2592 on September 20, 2022, to re-authorize the use of remote attendance at meetings, and the City Council desires to continue authorizing remote attendance at meetings as authorized by Government Code Section 54953 as amended by AB 361; and
- **WHEREAS**, neither the state of emergency proclaimed by the Governor on March 4, 2020, nor the state of emergency declared by the Fowler City Council on March 17, 2020, has been rescinded and the state of emergency remains in effect; and
- **WHEREAS**, Government Code Section 54953, as amended by AB 361, requires the City Council to make certain findings every thirty (30) days after approving Resolution No. 2592 in order to continue with remote teleconferencing.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FOWLER RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The City Council has reconsidered the circumstances of the COVID-19 state of emergency and finds that the following circumstances exist:
- A. The state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of members of the public, City Council members, and members of other City commissions to meet safely in person; and
- 2. This Resolution shall be effective immediately and a similar resolution shall be a standing item on City Council meeting agendas each month to reconsider the circumstances of the COVID-19 state of emergency and determine whether the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of members of the public, City Council members, and members of other City commissions to meet safely in person, or whether state or local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing, until the necessary findings required for continuing remote teleconferencing are no longer approved by the City Council.

APPROVE a Settlement Agreement and General Release with the Selma-Kingsburg-Fowler County Sanitation District (SKF) in the amount of \$70,270.23.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommend the City Council take the above action.

BACKGROUND

On July 12, 2007, the City of Fowler entered into a Reimbursement Agreement with SKF regarding certain sewer improvements related to Tract 5212 and oversized the infrastructure for future sewer system discharges within a Zone of Benefit. The term of the Reimbursement Agreement was for fifteen years, with a total amount reimbursed by the City to SKF of \$105,405.35. As the term of the Reimbursement Agreement has ended, but not all development has occurred within the Zone of Benefit, the City of Fowler and SKF have agreed to resolve the matter with a Settlement Agreement and General Release in the amount of \$70,270.23.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

This action does not constitute a "project" pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act.

FISCAL IMPACT

This payment will be funded using sewer development impact fees collected from single family home development that occurred within the Zone of Benefit.

SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT AND GENERAL RELEASE

THIS SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT AND GENERAL RELEASE ("Agreement") is made and entered into by and between the City of Fowler ("Fowler") and Selma-Kingsburg-Fowler County Sanitation District ("SKF") and collectively as "the Parties."

RECITALS

- A. The City of Fowler owns certain sewer improvements in the City of Fowler constructed under the City's Tract 5212.
- B. The improvements were oversized to serve future sewer system dischargers in a Zone of Benefit in the City of Fowler.
- C. On July 12, 2007, Fowler and SKF entered into a Reimbursement Agreement wherein the Parties agreed as follows:
 - 1. The parties wished to participate financially in the cost of the oversized improvements in the amount of \$369,398.62 with SKF's portion of participation being 28.5% (\$105,405.35);
 - 2. SKF agreed to contribute \$105,405.35 for the subject improvements;
 - 3. Fowler agreed to reimburse SKF as development occurred in a Zone of Benefit described in the Reimbursement Agreement;
 - 4. For each equivalent single family residence located in the Zone of Benefit and discharging to the improvements, Fowler was required to collect sewer facility fees so as to eventually recover SKF's total participation amount;
 - 5. Fowler was required to hold the sewer facility fees, keep account of them, and by November 30th of each year, Fowler shall pay 28.5% of said fees collected in the prior fiscal year to SKF; and
 - 6. The term of the Reimbursement Agreement was for a period of fifteen (15) years from the date.
- D. Fowler anticipates paying SKF approximately \$45,000-\$50,000 on November 30, 2022, in accordance with Section 7 of the Reimbursement Agreement.
- E. A dispute has arisen between Fowler and SKF relating to Fowler's obligation to pay SKF any remaining portion of the \$105,405.35 after the scheduled payment on November 30, 2022, for the sewer fees collected before the Reimbursement Agreement expired.
- F. All claims and disagreements of and by the Parties against each other are referred to in this Agreement as "Dispute."

G. Fowler and SKF, in order to avoid further litigation and attorneys' fees and costs connected therewith, and without admission of any liability, fact, claim, or defense by any party hereto, now desire to compromise and settle the referenced Dispute, and any other claims, wrongdoing or improper conduct asserted by the parties against each other against all present and possible future differences, disputes, claims, debts, assertions, or obligations arising from the matters described above.

AGREEMENT

In consideration of the foregoing recitals and in consideration of the mutual promises and agreements under this Agreement, Fowler and SKF agree and compromise as follows:

1. <u>Matter Settled and Compromised.</u> This Agreement constitutes a fully executed general release between Fowler and SKF of any claims, costs, and/or damages arising out of or in any way relating to or arising from the referenced Dispute.

2. Duties to be Performed.

- a. Fowler agrees to pay SKF the sum of \$70,270.23 on November 30, 2022, as full and final satisfaction of any reimbursement obligation created by the Reimbursement Agreement.
- b. SKF agrees to release Fowler from all claims related to the Reimbursement Agreement and for reimbursement of any future sewer facility fees collected by Fowler in the Zone of Benefit.
- 3. <u>General Release.</u> The Parties hereby release and forever discharge each other, their officers, employees, agents, attorneys, and others acting for, under, or in concert with each party, past and present, from any and all claims, demands, obligations, losses, causes of action, costs, expenses, attorneys' fees, liabilities, and indemnities of any nature whatsoever, and based on any legal or equitable theory of recovery, whether known or unknown, matured or to mature in the future, which they had, now have, or claim to have against one another arising out of the Dispute described in the above Recitals.
- 4. <u>Waiver of Claims.</u> The parties expressly waive the benefit of Civil Code Section 1542, which is set forth below, and specifically agree that, except as otherwise stated herein, this release shall extend to all claims arising out of transactions prior to the date of this Agreement which they do not know or expect to exist in their favor at this time. **Civil Code Section 1542 provides:**
 - "A general release does not extend to claims which the creditor does not know or suspect to exist in his or her favor at the time of executing this release, which if known by him or her must have materially affected his or her settlement with the debtor."

SKF and Fowler understand and acknowledge the significance and consequences of this Agreement and of such specific waiver of Section 1542 and expressly consent that this Agreement shall be given full force and effect according to each and all of its express terms and provisions,

including those relating to unknown and unsuspected claims, demands, obligations, and causes of actions, if any, as well as those relating to any other claims, demands, obligations, or causes of action hereinabove specified.

- 5. <u>Legal Representation</u>. The Parties hereby acknowledge that they have been represented in negotiations for and in the preparation of this Agreement by counsel of their choice, that they have read the Agreement and have had it fully explained to them by counsel, and that they are fully aware of the contents of this Agreement and of its legal effect.
- 6. Entire Agreement. This Agreement contains the entire agreement by and between the parties, and fully supersedes any and all prior agreements or understandings, written or oral, with respect to each matter hereof. No other agreements, oral or written, shall be deemed to exist or bind any of the parties hereto. An amendment or modification of this Agreement shall be effective only if in writing, signed by all parties hereto. All Recitals in this Agreement are incorporated herein by reference.
 - 7. <u>Effective Date.</u> This Agreement shall be effective upon full execution of all Parties.
- 8. <u>Binding Effect.</u> This Agreement shall bind and inure to the benefit of the respective successors, assigns, grantees, legatees, heirs, and personal representatives of the parties hereto.
- 9. <u>Governing Law.</u> This Agreement is entered into pursuant to the laws of the State of California, and shall be construed, interpreted, and governed in accordance therewith.
- 10. <u>Good Faith of Settlement Agreement.</u> The parties hereto acknowledge and agree that the settlement of the Dispute set forth in this Agreement constitutes one accomplished in good faith for purposes of the California Code of Civil Procedure, California Rules of Court, and other applicable laws.
- 11. <u>Counterparts.</u> This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original and all of which shall constitute together one and the same instrument. Facsimile and electronically scanned signatures shall have the same effect as originals.
- 12. <u>Captions.</u> The headings, titles, and captions contained in this Agreement are inserted only for the convenience of the parties and are for reference only, and in no way define, limit, extend, or describe the scope of this Agreement or the intent of any provision hereof.

13. Enforceability.

- a. This Agreement may be enforced by any of the parties hereto for the failure of any other party to comply with its terms and to seek any remedy available under law or equity, including specific performance or injunction.
- b. Should any provision of this Agreement be declared or be determined by any court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal, invalid, or unenforceable, the legality, validity, and enforceability of the remaining parts, terms, or provisions shall not be affected thereby, and said illegal, unenforceable, or invalid part, term, or provision shall be deemed not a part of this Agreement.

Fiscal Year 2022-23 1st Quarter Financial Report (Informational)

RECOMMENDATION

None.

BACKGROUND

The quarterly report summarizes the City's revenue and expenditure activity for the first quarter of the fiscal year from July 1, 2022 through September 30, 2022 by fund type.

GENERAL FUND

The General Fund covers core services such as police, fire, public works, community development, parks, recreation, and the senior center. Sales and property taxes are the two largest sources of revenue in the General Fund. Revenues in the General Fund are at 7% and expenditures are at 28% at the first guarter, as follows:

REVENUES

As summarized in Attachment A, the General Fund revenues received in the first quarter ending September 30, 2022 total 7% of the annual budget estimates while expenditures are on target at 28%. It is important to note that certain revenues are collected at various times throughout the year and, therefore, not reflected in the first quarter report. For example, the first installment of property tax revenues are collected in December/January. Staff is confident that projected revenues and expenditures will be consistent with what was budgeted.

PROPERTY TAX

Revenues are at 1% of budget

The major portion of property tax revenue is not scheduled to be distributed to cities until the end of December or early January and therefore not reflected in this report. The midyear or second quarter report will better reflect actual revenues compared to projections.

PERMITS/LICENSES

Revenues are at 36% of budget

The City received 36% of permits/licenses fees through September 30, 2022. Building permits are at \$244,876 and plan check fees at \$18,428 which make up a large portion of these estimated revenues.

FINES & FEES

Revenues are at 3% of budget

The first quarter reflects one month worth of court fines & fees received at 3%.

USE OF MONEY & PROPERTY RENTAL INCOME

Revenues are at 18% of budget

Revenues from rental and interest income are on target. The majority of rental income are received from Unwired broadband for the water tower.

MOTOR VEHICLE IN LIEU

Revenues are at 0% of budget

The motor vehicle in lieu revenues are property tax shares allocated to cities and counties by the State. The first payment is made each year in the month of December.

SALES TAX

Revenues are at 7% of budget

The City has received 7% of sales tax revenues representing one month for July 2022. Sales tax revenues are the largest revenue source in the General Fund.

TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY TAX

Revenues are at 0% of budget

The TOT taxes are received on a quarterly basis, the first payment will be received in October for the 2nd guarter.

FRANCHISE FEES

Revenues are at 0% of budget

Franchise fees are received in a quarterly basis, the first payment will be received in October for the 2nd quarter.

SERVICES & OTHER FEES

Revenues are at 14% of budget

Revenues from services & other fees are currently at 14% and are anticipated to meet budgeted expectations. These revenues are from fees from recreation, inspection, planning, park maintenance and special police.

GRANT

Revenues are at 1% of budget

Revenues from grant funding is at 1% for the first quarter. Local Public Safety Funds (LPSF) reflect one month worth of revenue.

OTHER MISC REVENUE

Revenues are at 61% of budget

Revenues from other sources at are currently at 61%. These miscellaneous revenues include donations, P.O.S.T reimbursements, restitution, and other refunds. It is typical for revenues in this category to reflect higher percentages than budgeted.

TRANSFER IN

Revenues are at 0% of budget

A general ledger entry will be done to allocate the transfer in and transfer out to the appropriate funds at year end.

EXPENDITURES

As summarized in Attachment A, The City has expended roughly 28% of its appropriations as of September 30, 2022. All departments are on target to their budgeted lines from actual to budget for the quarter.

As summarized in Attachment 'B' the summary of all funds reflect the revenues and expenditures for the first quarter ending September 30, 2022 by fund type.

ENTERPRISE FUNDS

WATER UTILITY FUNDS

Revenues 26% | Expenses 31%

Through September, expenses exceed revenues in the Water Utility Fund. While revenues were at 26% or less through September for the utility funds, expenses were slightly higher at 31%. At the end of this quarter the water revenues only reflect one month's worth of revenues; however at the end of the year the two months will be accrued.

SPECIAL REVENUES

UTILITY USERS TAX

Revenues 28% | Expenses 41%

Utility User's Tax is paid to the City one month in arrears, for the 1st quarter the amount received is \$124,081 in revenues and 41% in expenses. Amounts vary because usage varies from one season (hot summer) to the next (mild fall) and the next (cold winter).

DISTRICT SALES TAX (MEASURE N)

Revenues 9% | Expenses 20%

District Sales Tax Funds are received in a monthly basis. July revenues are reflecting in the first quarter at 9% and Expenses are at 20%.

COPS GRANT

Revenues 0% | Expenses 0%

Cops grant reimbursement are processed once expenses are made. The expenses will be adjusted at year end.

RECYCLE GRANT

Revenues 0% | Expenses 0%

Recycle grant are received annually. The first quarter reflects revenues at 0% and expense are at 0%.

GAS TAX

Revenues 20% | Expenses 0%

Highway User Tax are received monthly reflecting revenues for gas tax are at 20% for the first quarter and expense are at 0%.

ARPA FUNDS

Revenues 100% | Expenses 25%

The second tranche of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds has been received at 100% in revenues and expenses are currently at 25% for the first quarter. Expenses budgeted for these funds include one-time premium pay, audit support, city hall key control system, water tower rehab, website update, and downtown streetscape.

LTF ART 3 & 8

Revenues 0% | Expenses 1%

LTF revenues are generated from Fresno County. The LTF revenues are 0% in the first quarter and expense of 1% for utilities, such as P G & E, and street sweeping.

MEASURE C

Revenues 9% | Expenses 3%

Measure C revenues are received on a monthly basis showing revenues at 9% reflecting one month worth reflecting two months in arrears.

SB1 RMRA FUNDS

Revenues 18% | Expenses 0%

SB1 revenues are received from the State on a monthly basis 18% showing one month revenues for the first quarter.

ACTIVE TRNSPORT PLAN (ATP) FUNDS

Revenues 12% | Expenses 0%

ATP revenues are at 12% for the first quarter. Reimbursements are processed once expenses are made. The expenses will be adjusted at year end.

SRFC TRNS BLCK GRANT (STBG) FUNDS

Revenues 1% | Expenses 0%

STBG revenues are at 1% for the first quarter. Reimbursements are processed once expenses are made. The expenses will be adjusted at year end.

CDBG FUNDS

Revenues 4% | Expenses 0%

CDBG grant funds are currently at 4% for revenues and 0% for expenses in the first guarter.

STATE GRANT AB178 FUNDS

Revenues 0% | Expenses 0%

AB178 STATE GRANT is reflecting 0% in revenues and 0% in expenses for the first quarter.

AB1600 IMPACT FEES

Due to increased development activity in the City for impact fees, and the newly adopted impact fees schedule, the various AB1600 revenues are reflecting a range from 45% to 165% for the first quarter.

DEBT SERVICE FUNDS

The long-term debt report for the 1993-1 funds, Fire Station, and the Financing Authority are all showing expenses up to 98% for the first quarter of the year. This is due to a significant debt service payment being made in September for the first quarter. These payments are made semiannually and thus skew the first quarter picture. Additionally, principal payments are paid in the fall and not in the spring. Revenues and expenses are projected to meet the budgeted amount by the end of the year.

AGENCY FUNDS

STATE GRANT AB178 FIA PASS THROUGH FUND

Revenues 0% | Expenses 0%

The State Grant AB178 was created as a Fowler Improvement Association Pass-through to be distributed to FIA. For the first quarter revenues and expenses reflect 0%.

RDA SUCCESSOR FUND

Revenues 0% | Expenses 85%

The Successor RDA is responsible for the 2010 refunding bonds debt service. Two payments are made annually. The first made in the first quarter reflecting 85% in expenses for the 2010 refunding bonds.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

This action does not constitute a "project" pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act.

FISCAL IMPACT

Revenues and expenditures for all fund types are on target for the first quarter.

- Retitling the policy to more accurately reflect its scope.
- Expansion of the positions, based on operational need, that are eligible for a City-issued credit card.
- Formatting, simplification, and clarification edits.
- Expanded expectations of cardholders.
- Clarified process on receipts.
- Clarified biannual reporting process to City Council.

RESOLUTION NO. 2601

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FOWLER ADOPTING A POLICY ON CREDIT CARD ISSUANCE, USAGE, AND REPORTING

WHEREAS, the City Council, by adoption of Resolution No. 2363, approved an updated credit card policy (Policy) and authorized issuance of City credit cards to specified City employees to pay for official City business expenditures; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to make amendments to the Policy and the proposed amended Policy is attached as Exhibit A to this Resolution; and

WHEREAS, there is a legitimate business purpose for issuing City credit cards to certain City employees; and

WHEREAS, the consistent use of credit cards to pay for approved expenditures provides an accurate and verifiable business record for audit and accounting purposes; and

WHEREAS, this goal can be achieved by adopting a Policy on Credit Card Issuance, Usage, and Reporting.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Fowler that:

- 1. Resolution No. 2363 is hereby repealed.
- 2. The Policy on Credit Card Issuance, Usage, and Reporting attached hereto as Exhibit A is approved.
- 3. This Policy shall supersede Sections 8 and 9 of the City of Fowler Expense Reimbursement and Travel/Conference Policy for Legislative Officials, contained in Resolution No. 2067 adopted on October 3, 2006.

CITY OF FOWLER POLICY ON CREDIT CARD ISSUANCE, USAGE, AND REPORTING

- 1) <u>Purpose.</u> The purpose of this policy is to establish standards and procedures for the use of City-issued credit cards to conduct official City business.
- 2) <u>Eligible Employees.</u> Only the following City employees may receive a City-issued credit card:
 - a. City Manager;
 - b. Chief of Police;
 - c. City Clerk;
 - d. Community and Economic Development Director;
 - e. Finance Director;
 - f. Fire Chief;
 - g. Public Works Director;
 - h. Public Works Supervisor; and
 - i. Recreation and Senior Center Supervisor.
- 3) <u>Issuance.</u> City-issued credit cards are the property of the City of Fowler. The City Manager is responsible for authorizing a City-issued credit card. The Finance Director is responsible for the management of cardholders and ensuring cards are recovered and deactivated upon employee separation.
- 4) <u>Credit Limits.</u> The City Manager shall set monthly credit limits based on operational need.
- 5) Expenses and Documentation.
 - a. Expenses charged to City credit cards must be actual, necessary, reasonable, and incurred in the performance of official duties for a specific benefit to the City of Fowler.
 - b. All purchases must comply with purchasing policies including receiving quotes, informal bids, and/or formal bids when applicable.
 - c. Monthly Credit Card statements must reconcile to itemized receipts submitted to the Finance Director. The itemized receipts for each credit card charge should include a brief description of the business purpose and the budget account code corresponding to the charge. Failure to submit adequate documentation within one (1) month will result in the City issued credit card being deactivated.
 - d. Expenses charged on the City credit cards must be for approved budgeted items. Before any purchase is made, cardholders must verify budgeted funds are available.
 - e. <u>Business Meals and Hospitality</u>. Use of a City-issued credit card for business related meals is acceptable subject to the following criteria:
 - i. The City Manager, or a Department Head acting at the request of the City Manager, may find it appropriate on certain occasions to

conduct a business meal and pay for the meal of a local, state, or federal official, or a community or business leader. On occasion the City Manager or a Department Head, may find it necessary to have a working meal or to provide a meal to employees working overtime on an emergency project.

ii. Use of the City Credit card for these meals is permissible provided the business purpose for the meal is documented as required by this policy.

6) Unauthorized Expenses and Uses.

- a. Cash Advances:
- b. Alcoholic beverages;
- c. Personal purchases; and
- d. Purchases inconsistent with this or any other City policy.

7) Cardholder Responsibilities

- a. The cardholder is responsible for all charges made to the card.
- b. The cardholder shall sign the "Credit Card Issuance Acknowledgement."
- c. The cardholder shall comply with all provisions of this Policy.
- d. The cardholder shall notify the Finance Director immediately in the event a card is lost or stolen.
- e. The cardholder shall surrender the credit card upon separation from City employment.
- f. The cardholder shall surrender the credit card to the City Manager or Finance Director at any time, upon demand.
- 8) Missing Receipts. If a cardholder loses a receipt or fails to obtain an itemized receipt, the cardholder shall attempt to contact the vendor in order to provide a reprinted receipt. If a reprinted receipt cannot be provided, the cardholder shall provide the City Manager with a written letter identifying the purchase made and explanation for how or why a receipt was not obtained.
- 9) <u>Reporting.</u> The Finance Director shall provide a credit card usage report to the City Council with the annual and mid-year financial reports. The report shall contain:
 - a. A list of all employees with a City-issued credit card and their credit limit.
 - b. The name of the credit card company.
 - c. A certification that credit card statements have been reconciled to receipts and any documentation of discrepancies with receipts.
 - **d.** A summary of how the credit cards were used, and any other detail that may be requested by the City Manager or City Council.

- 3. Other actions as deemed appropriate by Council.

BACKGROUND

In April 2021, the City of Fowler awarded a contract to Don Berry Construction for pavement reconstruction of Adams Avenue between 5th Street and Temperance Avenue. The project was funded by the federal Surface Transportation Block Grant (formerly Regional Surface Transportation Program). The scope of work included replacement of the asphalt concrete pavement, construction of curb ramps at intersections, striping and pavement markings and miscellaneous associated work. The purpose of the project was to replace the failing asphalt pavement on Adams Avenue. The curb ramps were included because it is a requirement of the federal funding to provide Americans with Disability Act (ADA) accessible curb ramps at intersections. The federal funding does not require the curb, gutter or sidewalks between intersections to be improved.

A significant metric of the grant award is the benefit/cost ratio. Replacing non-standard curb and gutter along the corridor would not have increased the benefit of the project based on the application's formula, however, would have increased the cost of the project thus reducing the benefit/cost ratio and the City's chances of securing the grant.

In 2019, City staff was contacted by the property owners of property at 129 N. Second Street which abuts Adams Avenue regarding the permitting process to replace the existing driveway at their property. During the 2019 contact, the property owners did not request that the City replace the driveway at City cost or reconstruct the curb, gutter, or driveway approach in front of the property. At no time during the design or construction of the 2021 pavement reconstruction project did City staff receive a request from any property owners along the corridor to replace curbs, gutters or sidewalks along their property frontage or address any driveway approaches.

In April 2022, the property owners of property at 129 N. Second Street contacted City staff regarding construction of an accessory dwelling unit (ADU) and also inquired about the curb, gutter and driveway approach along the property frontage. The owners were informed of the ADU process and the process of obtaining an encroachment permit and performing the desired reconstruction work at their cost if they wished to do so.

In June 2022, the property owners requested that the curb, gutter, and driveway approach be reconstructed by the City because the facilities did not meet current City Standards. While age of the current curbs, gutters and driveway is unknown, based on the age of the residence, it is likely that original construction occurred around 1925. The property owners have indicated that the 10-inch curbs prohibit car doors from fully opening when cars are parked parallel and have reported that the 4-inch lip at the driveway approach prevents vehicular access to the garage. The property owners have also indicated that they believe the gutters were lowered by a City project occurring prior to the City's 2021 project. The City has found no evidence to support this claim. The curb, gutter and portion of the driveway approach containing the 4-inch lip lie within the City of Fowler street right-of-way. As such, the property owners have requested that the City replaced these facilities with curb, gutter and a driveway approach that meets current City of Fowler improvement standards.

As an ongoing goal of the City to provide walkable streets, staff has pursued pedestrian improvements along Adams Avenue between 7th Street and Temperance Avenue. The proposed project would construct sidewalks along sections of Adams Avenue where they currently do not exist or are non-ADA compliant, including replacement of non-standard curb, gutter and driveway approaches to facilitate installation of the sidewalks. An Active Transportation Program (ATP) grant application was submitted on June 15, 2022. The City will be notified whether the City's application for statewide funding was successful on October 21, 2022. If the City's project is not selected for statewide funding the application is automatically submitted for local funding. The local funded project list will be released by the Fresno Council of Governments on February 10, 2023. If the project is awarded, the improvements would likely be constructed in spring 2024.

The City has considered alternatives to resolving the issues brought forth by the property owner including instituting diagonal parking along the frontage of 129 N. Second Street to alleviate the curb blocking car doors from opening. The 40-foot curb to curb width of the road prevents diagonal parking from being a viable option at this location.

Historically, the City has only replaced non-standard infrastructure such as curbs, gutters, street lights (or lack thereof), non-paved alleys, non-standard sewer services (such as vitrified clay sewers and laterals, non-standard water services, and non-standard storm drainage facilities, as funding is available to do so. These improvements are typically prioritized based on safety, public benefit, or to alleviate a significant maintenance issue such as flooding or leaking utility services. Replacing facilities based solely on non-compliance with current standards would be financially infeasible for the City based on the numerous locations where these conditions exist and could set a precedent for these requests in the future.

The City of Fowler Zoning Ordinance addresses responsibility for maintenance of various improvements as follows:

Chapter 21 – NUISANCES Article 1. - Unlawful Property Related Nuisances 5-21.101 (g) - Neighborhood Preservation.

It shall be unlawful for any person owning, renting, leasing, occupying, or having charge or possession of any real property in the City to maintain such property in a manner that any of the following conditions are found to exist thereon, except as may be allowed by the Municipal Code. These conditions meet one or more of the following criteria and are considered nuisances subject to abatement and cost recovery pursuant to Chapters 22 and 23: substantially detract from the appearance of the immediate neighborhood, reduce the property value in the immediate neighborhood, are an attractive nuisance, are materially detrimental to nearby properties and improvements, are a visual blight, are offensive to the senses, or are otherwise dangerous to public health, safety or welfare.

- (a) (f) omitted for brevity.
- (g) Deteriorated Improvements. Walls, fences, hedges, driveways, sidewalks, walkways, and similar improvements which have become deteriorated, hazardous, defective, or unsightly.

Therefore, if the curb, gutter, sidewalk and/or driveway improvements are determined to be a safety hazard, the ordinance places the responsibility for repairing the improvements on the property owner. City staff does not believe that the curb, gutter, and driveway approaches along Second Street or Adams Avenue are a nuisance. While they may not meet current City standards, that does not mean they are a nuisance or public safety hazard that the property owners must address.

Staff has identified options related to the request by the property owners of 129 N. Second Street as follows:

- 1. Notify the property owner that the City intends to pursue improvements to public facilities surrounding the subject property through an Active Transportation Program grant, if such grant is awarded.
- 2. Direct staff to design, solicit bids, and award a contract for reconstruction of curbs, gutters, and driveway approach to meet current design standards.
- 3. Other actions as deemed appropriate by Council.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

If a project is initiated, it will be evaluated for compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act. It is anticipated that any project would qualify for a categorical exemption.

FISCAL IMPACT

The completion of the requested improvements by the City is anticipated to cost approximately \$75,000. These costs are not currently budgeted and would require consideration of a budget amendment to the Measure C and/or LTF Article 8 accounts.


If the project is funded by the ATP grant, there would not be a fiscal impact to the City of Fowler.





SUBJECT

APPROVE Resolution No. 2602 Establishing a Fire Academy Training Grant Program

RECOMMENDATION

For the City Council to consider and approve the Resolution establishing the program to provide grant funding for Fire Academy Training Program expenses.

BACKGROUND

During recent City Council meetings direction has been provided to staff that the City Council desires to establish a program to provide grant funding for Fire Academy Training Program expenses for former volunteer firefighters with the Fowler Fire Department who meet certain criteria. Staff has identified available funding in the amount of \$25,000 to make available for this program, and a budget amendment will be presented by the Finance Director at a future City Council meeting to allocate \$25,000 from the general fund for this program.

Based on City Council direction at previous meetings, the attached Resolution contains the criteria that must be satisfied to be eligible for funding under this program. The funding will be provided as a grant and paid directly to Fresno City College on behalf of the participant.

Additionally, State Center Community College District (SCCCD) and Fresno City College (FCC) have provided the City Manager a letter of intent to partner with the City to help support firefighter training for 5-7 former volunteer firefighters. SCCCD and FCC have committed to developing a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the City to ensure spots are available to former volunteer firefighters in upcoming fire academies. The letter of intent from SCCCD and FCC is attached to this staff report. The

terms of the MOU (prices for tuition, materials, and supplies needed for cadets to attend the fire academy) are still to be negotiated. If the City Council approves the City's program, the Resolution

provides that authority is delegated to the City Manager to negotiate and approve the MOU with SCCCD and FCC so as to implement this program.

The program eligibility criteria are as follows:

- Must have been a current volunteer as of 6/30/22.
- Must have returned all City-owned fire equipment assigned to the individual volunteer.
- Enroll in basic fire academy training course at Fresno City College with an estimated completion date no later than December 31, 2023.
- Grant amount is limited to the applicable tuition or program enrollment fees (which include protective equipment) for the basic fire academy training course at Fresno City College.
- The City will pay the applicable tuition or program enrollment fees to State Center Community College District or Fresno City College directly on the participants behalf.
- Participants are eligible for only one grant opportunity meaning, if someone enrolls in but does not complete the course the participate is not eligible for a grant to enroll in a later course.
- Funds will not need to be repaid to the City.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

This action does not constitute a "project" pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act.

FISCAL IMPACT

If approved, a budget amendment will be presented at a future meeting for City Council approval during the Mid-Year Budget Review to make the necessary budget amendment to fund this program in the amount of \$25,000 from the general fund.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST

RESOLUTION NO. 2602

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FOWLER ESTABLISHING A FIRE ACADEMY TRAINING COURSE GRANT PROGRAM THROUGH FRESNO CITY COLLEGE

WHEREAS, the City of Fowler operated Fire Department staffed with volunteer firefighters for many decades until the City recently entered into a contract with the Fresno County Fire Protection District to provide fire protection services for the City of Fowler; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the contract with Fresno County Fire Protection District, the services of Fowler's volunteer firefighters were no longer necessary; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to evaluate the possibility and endeavors to establish a Fowler Fire Department in the near future staffed with firefighters who are City employees; and

WHEREAS, given the long history of volunteer fire service in the City of Fowler and the importance of fire protection services to public safety in the City of Fowler and surrounding region, the City Council desires to establish a program that offers former Fowler volunteer firefighters an opportunity to complete basic fire academy training coursework at Fresno City College's Fire Training Academy, which will enable them to be qualified to become eligible for municipal fire protection services with surrounding fire agencies, including a future Fowler Fire Department.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FOWLER RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. A Fire Academy Training Course Grant Program ("Program") is hereby established with the following criteria:
 - (a) The Program shall be funded with a \$25,000.00 allocation from the City's general fund to be approved by a separate budget amendment resolution.
 - (b) Only current volunteer firefighters with the Fowler Fire Department as of June 30, 2022, are eligible to participate in the Program.
 - (c) All City-owned fire equipment assigned to the former volunteer must be returned to the City to be eligible to participate in the Program.
 - (d) Participants must enroll in a basic fire academy training course at Fresno City College with an estimated completion date of no later than December 31, 2023.
 - (e) The Program shall provide grant funding in the form of payment directly to State Center Community College District or Fresno City College for the applicable tuition or program enrollment fees (which include supplies and protective equipment) for the basic fire academy training course at Fresno City College.
 - (f) Participants shall be eligible for only one grant opportunity and Program-paid enrollment in only one fire academy training course at Fresno City College.
 - (g) Participants shall not be required to repay the City for Program funds paid to Fresno City College.
 - (h) Program funding shall be available only until December 31, 2023, and this Program shall end on December 31, 2023, and any remaining Program funds at that time

shall be returned to the City's general fund unless the City Council extends the Program.

2. The City Manager is authorized to negotiate with and enter into an agreement with State Center Community College District and Fresno City College as reasonably necessary to implement and administer this Program and the payment of course enrollment fees on behalf of eligible Program participants.
